for the British commission, announced
the receipt of a cablegram from the
minister of food, London, to the effect
that the fixed prices on Canadian cream-
ery butter bought by the commission
would be reduced to 47c, as compared
with 49c a pound now being paid. The
price is for No. 1 grass butter.

WANT FEDERAL GOVT. TO BACK DEEP WATERWAY

Association Also Requests
Financial Aid From
Ontario.

TORONTO, Dec. 17.—Resolutions
were passed by the Canadian Deep
Waterways and Power Association at
its meeting here today, urging the On-
tario Government to give substantial
financial aid to the association in
carrying on its operations, calling upon
the Dominion Government to speed up
the Welland ship canal construction
and all public works in Canada with
a view to relieving the wide-spread
unemployment and consequent distress,
and asking the Federal Government to
indorse the deepening of the St. Law-
rence River at the earliest possible
moment, so as to allow ocean tonnage
to reach the head of the lakes, and
make it possible to develop more
power.

Promoted Grant.
Major Alex. C. Lewis, secretary of
the association, stated that Premier
Drury had assured a deputation from
the association yesterday that he would
personally support the project, and
had promised a grant towards carry-
ing on the work of the association.
Senator Irvine L. Lennox of Wiscon-
sin, United States, and S. A. Thomp-
son, consulting engineer, New York,
spoke in support of the project of the
deepening of the St. Lawrence.

Newton Favored For Secretary

Recommended by St. Thomas
Committee At Meeting
Last Night.

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 17.—The internal
management committee of the board
of education, at its last meeting for
the year tonight, recommended the
appointment of Truant Officer W. G.
Newton as secretary-treasurer of the
board, his allowance for both offices
to be \$1,500 yearly. Mr. Newton is
now receiving \$1,200 as truant officer.
Mr. Newton will accept at that figure,
and nothing else.

SENATE APPROVES.
ROME, Dec. 17.—The Senate today
passed the treaty of Rapallo, settling
the question of Italian claims and
Jugo-Slavs. The vote was 262 in favor
and 22 against the proposal.

GETS ANOTHER TERM

HEWITT PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO THEFT CHARGE

Young Londoner On Trial in
Connection With Car
Robbery.

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 17.—Allan Hewitt
of London, a former restaurateur at
Springbank, was placed on trial today
on a charge of breaking into a car on
the L. and P. S. Railway and stealing
a quantity of merchandise shipped to
parties along the line of the Pere Mar-
quette.

Hewitt and a couple of others were
caught getting away with the goods,
which were scattered along the side of
the track north of the city, and placed
under arrest. The others got away,
and have never been identified.

According to the preliminary evidence
given at the opening of the trial, goods
had been shipped from Macurel & Co.,
and McMahen, Granger & Co., London,
to several of their customers, and much
of the goods recovered belonged to the
firms.

CRIME CARNIVAL STIRS NEW YORK POLICE TO ACT

Officers Arrest Two Men and
Woman—Bandits Rob
Court.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Spurred to
fast action by a carnival of crime in
this city within the last 24 hours, the
police today arrested two men and a
woman in connection with the killing of
Police Officer Floyd Norton in a running
fight with automobile bandits last night.
The arrests followed discovery in the
Bronx of a bullet-riddled automobile,
in which the bandits are believed to
have fled after holding up an elevator
man, and on the running board of which
Norton met his death in a grim re-
volver duel while trying to arrest the
gang.

The arrests also followed the action of
Michael Loresch of Brooklyn, in having
taken to a hospital the body of his
brother, Joseph, which he said he had
found in his room early today with a
fatal bullet wound. On the body of
Joseph was found a watch tallying with
the description of that taken from the
elevator man who had been held up.
Those under arrest are Michael Lor-
esch, Joseph Cavanaugh and Emma
Brooks. The woman had a bullet wound
in the elbow, and the police are working
on the theory that after the Norton
shooting the prisoners drove to Brook-
lyn and deposited in Michael's home the
body of Joseph. It became known to-
day that the criminals, who have been
taunting the police with raids into the
very centre of the city's shopping and
hotel districts, have extended their pil-
grimage to municipal courts.

It was found this morning that
cracksmen had broken open a safe in
a fashionable cafe in the West 125th Street
Court, and looted it of \$2,000.

RABBI CHARGED WITH ILLEGAL SALE OF LIQUOR

Pleads Not Guilty To Allege-
ations Made by Former Em-
ployee of Spracklin's.

WINDSOR, Dec. 17.—Hebrew Rabbi
Isaac M. Spracklin, minister in police court
today, when Samuel Abramson, Jewish
rabbi, appeared to answer a charge of
illegally selling liquor. The charge was
preferred by Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin.
He was supported in his testimony by his
brother, Rev. Arthur Spracklin, and
Joe Bragman, formerly employed by the
Spracklins.

The offence with which Rabbi Abram-
son is charged and to which he pleads
not guilty, is said to have occurred at
his residence on the night of October 27.
Bragman made a statement pro-
duced in court by which he claims to
have bought three cases of liquor from
Abramson for which he paid \$180.
Frederick Kerby, appearing for Rabbi
Abramson in cross-examination, testi-
fied that Spracklin, brought out the fact
that the search warrant dated October 27
and signed by Magistrate Hall, had been
filled in, with the exception of the signature
of the magistrate the night of October 27.
In reply to a question declared he did
not know the warrant was illegal.
Bragman went on to say that he was
purchasing the liquor, but they were unaware
as to where he was going. Abramson's
name had not been mentioned.

Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, when asked
as to what Bragman had been paid,
stated that he had given him \$25 on
one occasion and \$10 another time. The
understanding was that he was to be
paid, according to results obtained, but
as he was out of work this money had
been advanced before the case was con-
cluded. It was not given to influence
the statement of the witness, Rev. J. O.
L. Spracklin testified.

BRITISH MILLS SELL TO RUSSIA AS GOVT. LAGS

Manufacturers Enter Musco-
vite Markets While Negotia-
tions Drag.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The protracted
negotiations for resumption of trade
between Great Britain and Soviet Russia
are not preventing British manufactur-
ers from taking advantage of the
Russian markets. At least two large
Yorkshire woolen mills are working at
high pressure to turn out orders for
hundreds of thousands of yards of
textiles for Russian account, it became
known here today.

As Yorkshire men proverbially are
hard-headed businessmen the guarantee
for payment they obtained are interest-
ing commercial circles where it is be-
lieved the financial end of the deal
must have been arranged through
neutral, probably Scandinavian banks.
Through these banks, it is said, it was
easy to give drafts for Soviet gold
which is known to have been deposited
in several European cities some time
ago.

REPORT IS NOT CREDITED.
CHATHAM, Dec. 17.—The report
that R. L. Gossell, Blenheim barrister,
is to be appointed to the vacant county
court clerkship for Kent is not gener-
ally credited, and it is still believed
that Capt. Douglas Chatham re-
turned soldier, will be appointed to the
position.

SAYS NATIONAL UNITY IMPOSSIBLE WHILE MEIGHEN GOVT. STAYS

Nova Scotian Lawmaker
States Meighen Divides
Canada.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—(By Canadian
Press).—Eulogizing the work which
the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier had done
for all Canadians, in an address be-
fore the Liberal Club of Ottawa last
night, Hon. Robert E. Finn, repre-
senting Halifax in the Nova Scotian
Legislature, compared with Sir Wil-
frid's work that of Sir Robert Bor-
den's Government and the Govern-
ment of Hon. Arthur Meighen.

The speaker made appeal for
national unity, which, he said, could
never be brought about while there
was in power at Ottawa a Govern-
ment which divided the people
against themselves. The old Conser-
vative party of Sir John A. Macdonald
was not present in the new National
Liberal and Conservative party, Mr.
Finn declared, and the traditions be-
hind Sir John's party seemed to have
been forgotten. He said that Sir
Macdonald would not have allowed
the French-Canadians to be so long
without cabinet representation as had
been the case.

Pleads Not Guilty.
The accused, who was represented by
J. M. McEvoy, London, pleaded not
guilty to the charge, and proof of the
shipment of the merchandise to the
L. and P. S., and the receiving of it
by an employee of the line, was ad-
vanced by J. McMahen, who said that

Both Are Blamed.
The action of Nell C. Sinclair, St.
Thomas, against Alexander Somerville,

and that each pay his own costs, or

The Presentment.
The grand jury, which completed and

citizens from the countryside,
factory understanding be brought about
between the people of the city and

the age of 75, should not apply in the
case of Judge C. W. Collier of Elgin County.
They emphasized the fact that under
the prevailing conditions the fees of the
jury barely covers their expenses.

In referring to the closing of Judge
Collier's term of office, the jury re-
commended that some statutory
works out a hardship. We recognize
the fact, said the foreman, that in some
cases, when a man reaches the age of
75 years, he is not capable to be an ad-
ministrator of justice, but we know that
in your case you are mentally at the
height of your career. We hope that in
your case you may continue for many
years to do as you have always done,
tempering justice with mercy, for we
sincerely believe that a judge who ad-
ministers the law in the manner in
which you have is as much a disciple
of Him who stands upon the throne
as to whom we listen on the Sabbath
eve." His honor made a suitable reply.

Former Chief Is Given Two Years on Theft Charge

Sam Bickley Is Sent To King-
ston Penitentiary by Wood-
stock Judge.

WOODSTOCK, Dec. 17.—Two years in
Kingston penitentiary at hard labor was
the sentence imposed on Sam Bickley,
ex-policeman, by Judge Wallace on two
charges of breaking and entering into
cellars. Bickley pleaded guilty to both
charges. He said in his story that Alex
Green, who will be sentenced Saturday,
actually entered the cellars, while he
remained outside. The judge took into
consideration Bickley's long military
record, but said he could not at the
present time, when a serious crime wave
seems to be sweeping the country, allow
him to go on suspended sentence. Bick-
ley was chief of police here for two
years.

WALL STREET FIRM FAILS.
NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Failure of the
East street firm of Hamilton, Lyon &
Walton was announced today from the
rostrum of the New York stock ex-
change, in a matter which the concern was
a member. No statement regarding the
liabilities and assets of the brokerage
house was issued.
