MERCER, Pa., May 10.—James Boyle was sentenced to-day to life imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary at Pittsburg for the kidnapping of Mrs. Boyle, indicted as Mary Doe, received a sentence of 25 years with a fine of \$5000 and the costs of the

Both prisoners utterly collapsed.
Judge Williams, in imposing sentence, pointed to Boyle's bad record
for larceny, assault and jail break-

ing.

To-night Boyle issued a statement, implicating Haarry Forker, a brother of Mrs. Whitla, in the kidnapping, and asserting that he had turned over inceriminating letters to Mr. Whitla under promise of immunity from prosecution. Both men to-night say: "The statement is a wilful and malicious lie." This afternoon District Attorney Lininger said that the kidnapping was still under investigation and that if any third party was found implicated he would be prosecuted without fear or favor.

J. M. Lininger, district attorney, said: "At no time has our secret or open investigation indicated that there

"I have known Harry Forker for a great many years," said Judge H. S. Miller, chief counsel for the Boyles. "I am confident there is nothing at all in the story regarding him."

J. H. Stranehan, jr., who assisted Judge Miller in defending the Boyles, said: "I do not believe there is any truth in the sensational story told by Boyle, I investigated the matter thoroly several days ago and the essential parts will not hold water."

Supplementary Estimates Are Smallest in Years - A Busy Day in the . House,

OTTAWA, May 10 .- (Special.)-Hon. W. S. Fielding will move on Wednesday a resolution that it is expedient to authorize the governor-in-council to raise a fifty million dollar loan for the

purpose of paying maturing loans and obligations of the Dominion and for the carrying on of public works.

The supplementary estimates were brought down to-day. They amount to \$1,016,689, of which \$83,589 is charge-able to capital account. The supplementaries are the smallest for a number of years.

mentaries are the smallest for a number of years.

Along with the main estimates brought down earlier in the session they total \$111,506,460 for the current fiscal year, of which \$\$1,011,721 is chargeable to consolidated fund, and \$\$30,494,739 to capital account.

Further supplementary estimates for the past fiscal year were also tabled, including \$100,000 for the Italian earthquake fund; \$100,000 for the cost of the cattle quarantine along the international boundary and \$10,000 for the expenses of Canadian representatives to the agricultural conference at Rome.

The expenditure which parliament has been asked to authorize this year shows a total decrease of \$21,774,772, as compared with last year. Of this decrease \$\$,611,846 is on consolidated fund account and \$13,163,626 on capital account.
