The rarest quality is the faculty of being a teacher of a high order, and it was just as rare to have a man of high outstanding teaching capacity as to find a great leader in the business world.

Another objection was that the ccurses given were not such as to equip a man for the business life. What use were Latin and Greek, ab-What use were Latin and Greek, abstruse philosophy or mathematics in trade? But men might be adapted and trained for the type of life in which they were to spend their energies in other courses in the university that Latin and Greek, altho he considered the discipline of learning Greek to be one of the best. If Greek was mastered there would be no difficulty in learning other languages, and a thorostudy of a foreign language gave a critical polish to the mind, a knowcritical polish to the mind, a know-ledge of the meaning of words, an accuracy of thought and oft times of meaning in expression not to be gain-

ed otherwise.
What He Should Know. The university should not offer such course as the technical school. Business was complex and they could not give the special training of a business college, but there was an educational background to be provided for the business man which the university could furnish. He required versity could furnish. He an education in literature as every an education in literature as every man in business now admitted. He should be master of one or two languages, and he should know somestages, and he should know some-thing of the social and physical en-vironment of the field of his activity. Some of the most subtle changes in business life were due to social ele-ments, and moral disorders, and they should know how the world was af-fected by such problems. They should have a knowledge of bistered have a knowledge of history and of geography in the large sense, of the inter-relations of men, of their resources, of the history of trade and commerce. One of the most fruitful methods of study was the historical, orginning at the beginning of things, to show how they grow and come down the stream of time. These subjects should be handled from a broad point of view with a large sweep bright before the student, for humanity was complicated in its ramifications and of

University and Business. He did not think men in Canada went to the university for enjoyment. They were too poor yet, and he hoped they would not have that degrada-tion. Men should enter, live in and issue from the university with a sense of the earnestness of life, and come forth with a higher ideal of the career of a business man or citizen.

For the business world at large the university ought to be able to assist in getting better results in actual production. They all knew what had been done in Germany. Science could be applied to commence and manufacture and the nation blessed with science of a high order would be lessed above others.

He was struck in Canada with the reflection that with their resources there was such lack of thought. well endowed were they that they not recognize the necessity of economy and of exactitude. They had not become thoro. Perhaps they had not been forced to do so yet. But the days would come when matters must be changed, and it would be the part of wisdom to be thoro and efficient, and to use with economy what they had.
