BY THE HARBOR BOARD

Toronto's New Manufacturing District is Explained and Photographs Shown.

FULL DETAILS GIVEN

Firms Are Expected to Be Attracted to Toronto by Getting the Facts.

"A District Created for Manufactur-ers," is the title of a booklet just issued by the Toronto Harbor Commis sioners, explaining what the Toronto harbor industrial district means to prospective Toronto manufacturers. District," it shows how the land will have been reclaimed or filled up to a building grade, by pumping 17,445,000 cubic yards of sand from the bed of Toronto Bay and Lake Ontario. A ship canal 6800 feet long and 400 feet wide and 24 feet deep is also part of the project. When the work is com-pleted, in 1921, about \$25,000,000 will have been expended, including the cost of developing the water front and harbor. There will be 646 acres for fac-tory sites, 235 acres of streets and raliway reservations, 130 acres of waterways. 30 miles of public road-ways, varying from 75 to 175 feet wide, and 50 miles of railway sidings under control of the harbor commissioners.


