Witness Testifies to Joe Wing's Behavior Prior to Entering Hospital.

No very direct evidence bearing on the case was given at the morgue last night at the inquest into the death of Joe Wing, a Chinaman, who died on Saturday, July 10, at the General Hospital under rather peculiar circumstances. Wing had met with an accident on the preceding Thursday, July 8, when he fell from a Broadway street car. He was then taken to the General Hospital, but was discharged on the following Saturday morning as being recovered from his injuries.

County Constable Wilson said when he was notified he went to the scene and found the Chinaman lying there with several cuts on his forehead. Constable Baker arrived a few minutes later and they took him to a doctor nearby, who ordered his removal to the General Hospital.
