"In brief, the history and present operation of these Standard Oil interests shows throughout the past thirty-five years a substantial monopolization of the petroleum industry of the country, a deliberate destruction of competition, and a consequent control of that industry by less than a dozen men who have reaped enormous profits therefrom, The commercial efficiency of the Standard, while very great, has been consistently directed, not at reducing prices to the public, and thus maintaining its predominant position through superior service, but rather at crippling existing rivals and preventing the rise of new ones by vexatious and oppressive attacks upon them, and by securing for itself most unfair and wide-reaching discriminations in transportation facilities and rates, both by railroad and by pipe line, while refusing such facilities so far as possible to all competitors."

The above is from the report of the U. S. Burcau of Corporations, after an enquiry into the affairs of the Standard Oil Trust.
