LATE LOCALS

The Women's Missionary Society of Portland Methodist church met at the residence of Mrs. F. S. Thomas, Main street, last evening, when routine business was transacted. The benches have made their appearance on King Square again, resplendent in a new coat of green and red paint. The square is being cleaned up, dressing put on the soil and the grass already commences to look green.

Twelve burial permits were issued by the office of the board of health last week as follows:--From consumption and broncho pneumonia, two; cystitis, spophy, meningitis, tuberculosis, scurvy, chronic endocarditis, intestinal obstruction, and sortie regurgitation, one each.

Rev. J. W. Kierstead of Oxford, N. S., has accepted the call to the Tabernacle Baptist church, Haymarket square, and will take up his new work on the first Sunday in June. Rev. P. J. Stackhouse, the present pastor, who goes to Campbellton, N. B., completes his pastorate in the Tabernacle tomorrow.

A committee from the water and sewerage board will visit the premises of Andrew Myles on Wright street next week to see what arrangements can be made for extending the sewerage system to his property. Some action is necessary as the board of health authorities are pressing Mr. Myles to remedy the existing conditions.

If the person finding a ticket for Liverpool via steamer "Lake Erie," which leaves tomorrow morning, will kindly return it to C. P. R. office, King st., it will be an act of charity to the unfortunate young man who stated his trouble to the Times today. PARLIAMENT PROROGUED

OTTAWA, Ont., April 27--(Special)--Parliament was prorogued at three o'clock today. The guard of honor was supplied by the Governor General's Foot Guards, and the field battery fired a salute from Nepean Point.

The only legislation of any great importance was the tariff revision, and notwithstanding this, there was a session of four months and five days. Parliament met on November 12.

POLICE COURT

Today's police court session was held an hour earlier than usual. There were only two cases on the docket and these were quickly disposed of. George Marshall who was given in charge by James Garnett, for wilfully breaking windows in his store at 711 Main street, was sent in on remand. John Magee, charged with drunkenness and begging, on Main street was also remanded.

The property was sold by the city chamberlain for back city taxes. Sold to A. C. Clark for \$110.

THE KNOCKER

The wretched ferry service with which St. John residents on both sides of the harbor are contending at the present time was plainly illustrated yesterday when the Ludlow--the joke of the ferry fleet--was laid out twice in about six hours. Meanwhile fuming, fuming passengers cooled their heels and swore and waited their time. About 11:30 the joke suffered her first mishap. In the middle of the harbor she was seized with a "pain" in the rudder and accordingly she missed several trips while her "inwardly" were being tinkered with. As a result of her sudden indisposition a number of west end residents missed their dinner. Again about 5:20 last night the Ludlow had a weakness and for an hour she remained in the east side slip. For the second time in a few hours were Carletonians kept late for meals. Several passengers who had previously experienced the Ludlow's peevishness left her at once and journeyed in west end by the street cars.

OBJECT TO THE ASPHALT PLANT

King Street East Residents Say Its Establishment There Would be an "Odorous" Shame.

A petition is being circulated and is largely signed by residents in the vicinity of King street east and Carmarthen street, protesting against the establishment of the city's asphalt plant in the corporation yard there. The people object on the ground that there is an offensive odor from the mixing of the asphalt. Mr. Burns, secretary of the board of health when asked if the board intended taking any action, said he was not in a position to speak about the matter as it would have to come before a meeting of the board. An inspector has visited the place, but so far there is nothing that could be objected to as the work of manufacturing has not yet commenced. Mr. Burns was in doubt as to whether the board would have any power to deal with the matter, as it depended on whether it was a matter concerning the public health.

NEWS FROM P. E. ISLAND

Oddfellows Celebrate -- New Court House and Jail for Summerside.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I. April 27--(Special)--The Oddfellows of Charlottetown celebrated their national day yesterday with a grand parade in the afternoon followed by service at Zion church where an eloquent sermon was preached by the pastor, George E. Rose. At night the play "The Banker's Daughter," was put on by local talent in the Opera House.

S. F. Woodroffe left here today for Halifax to preside at the opening of the Garrison Chapel in connection with Trinity parish.

At a meeting of the executive of the provincial government yesterday a committee was appointed to arrange at once for the building of a new court house and jail at Summerside to replace the one destroyed by fire.

An experimental farm to be established by the Dominion government was fully discussed. Dr. Saunders, director of the central experimental farm at Ottawa, is expected shortly to select a site.

The water commissioners of Summerside have decided to call for tenders for a water works and sewerage system. Immediately after the tenders are received a plebiscite will be held to ascertain the opinion of the people as to the advisability of installing a system. In the meantime further data will be submitted.

DR. LEACOCK AT HALIFAX

His Lecture on Imperial Unity Last Evening Received With Enthusiasm.

HALIFAX, N. S. April 26--(Special)--Dr. Stephen Leacock, of McGill University, who sails for England on a tour of the empire, under the auspices of the Cecil Rhodes trustees, lectured tonight. He made a strong plea for imperial unity, holding that conditions cannot remain as they are. There must be an advance and change. He believed it was coming and would make for a welding together of the empire in bonds that would never be dissolved and would be a grand thing for the Anglo-Saxon race and the world. We must all be made brothers and no longer remain children of the people of England.
