

buildings known as Beverly-street, St. George's-square. Immediately east of the Grange, approached as before mentioned, is "Pinehurst," (occupied as a ladies' seminary, under the superintendence of Monsieur and Madame Deslandes,) which may be termed St. George's-square east. *McGill-square* may be said to be bounded by Church-street on the east, Bond-street on the west, Shuter-street on the north, and Queen-street on the south. If the grounds surrounding Mr. McCutcheon's residence were laid out, (as it is said was the original intention,) McGill-square would be the most delightful part of the city.

We will now close our remarks by alluding to some of the main advantages which the city possesses, and which are more particularly detailed elsewhere. To begin with the more substantial ones: The city is lighted with gas; there are water works for the conveyance of water to the different houses, and for the extinction of fires; the city is well drained by common sewers; there are also regular stations for coaches, cabs and carts; steamboats leave daily for Kingston, Hamilton, Niagara, Queenston, Lewiston, Rochester and Oswego, calling at the intermediate ports; and in addition to the regular Eastern, Western, and Northern Mail Stages that run daily throughout the year, there are others that run regularly to York Mills, Richmond-hill, Thornhill, Cooksville, Streetsville, Brampton, Oshawa, the Rouge, Vaughan and Markham Villages; and Omnibuses run half-hourly from the corner of Yonge and King-streets and the Market-square to Yorkville, and hourly between the Market-square and other points of the city to the Garrison and the Lunatic Asylum; a horse-ferry boat and small steamer leave the city every alternate hour for different points on the Island—fare to and fro, 7½d. Our Market is plentifully supplied with all sorts of fish, flesh and fowl, fruit and vegetables, and all the necessities of life—and frequently with many of the luxuries, such as game, &c. The city has a regular though limited police force, and an efficient fire brigade. The principal hotels are favourably situated, being close to the wharves, forwarding establishments, Banks, Custom-house, Post-office and Stage offices. There are several Banks, a Board of Trade, a Telegraph office, an Emigrant office; several Fire, Marine, Life and Live Stock Insurance Companies and Offices.

Amongst the various Institutions and Associations which will be noticed under their appropriate heads, are the following:—Several Lodges and a Provincial Grand Lodge of Freemasons; several Odd Fellows' Lodges; the Sons of Temperance, and several other orders of Temperance Societies; St. George's, St. Patrick's, and St. Andrew's Societies; Church Society, Bible & Tract Societies, Ladies' Bible Association; several Building Societies; County of York Agricultural Society; Philharmonic Society; two Firemen's Halls; the Athenæum and Commercial News Room; Mechanics' Institute; a General Hospital; three Lying-in Hospitals; a Dispensary; a Theatre; a Cricket Club; a Curling Club; a Bowling Club; a Savings Bank; an Asylum; a House of Industry; a University; a Theological Seminary and Academy; Upper Canada College; Knox's College; a Medical School; County of York Grammar School; several Ladies' and other Academies; the Provincial Normal School; a Model School, and several Public and Private Schools. There are several Newspapers published in Toronto, weekly, bi-weekly, tri-weekly, and daily, and Periodicals on Legal, Agricultural, Educational and Ecclesiastical subjects.
