STOCKS DOWN AT MARKET OPENING

New York, Nov. 30.—Wall Street.—Utah Coppers' three point decline and Baltimore and Ohio's decrease of one point, led the market to the new minimum of 48 featured the initial trading on the stock market today. Pennsylvania also fell a fraction to the new low record of 45 1/2. Other railroads and industrials were depressed, presumably in consequence of foreign developments. U. S. Steel, selling minus regular and extra dividends of 4 1/2 points, reacted two points, other equipments yielding from fractions to three points. Liberty bonds were inactive and slightly lower.

RESTORES FIND OF GOLD.

After 25 Years H. J. Helberg Returns Money With Interest.

New York, Nov. 30.—Hjalmar J. Helberg, now living at 461 West 164th street, found twenty-five years ago in Central Park West a red pocketbook, in which was \$400 in gold. Hard up then, he banked the money and used some of it. Later he prospered somewhat and now has restored what he had used. He presented to Lieutenant McCann in the West 117th street station an envelope containing \$1,025, which he said represented his find, with compound interest at 6 per cent.

If the rightful owner is not found, he wants the money to go to the police pension fund, though under the law he may recuse himself and have a card bearing a woman's name and the address of a hotel around Fifty-eighth or Fifty-ninth street was in the pocketbook when he found it, but he recalls neither name nor address.

Quebec Liberal's Prediction.

Montreal, Nov. 30.—Alfred Leduc, Liberal candidate in Westmount-St. Henry division, at a meeting in his behalf last night, predicted that the Liberals would carry sixty-two or sixty-three in Quebec, and from 135 to 140 out of the 235 federal divisions. He admitted the possibility of two or three Unionist candidates being elected in this province.

CHANCELLOR BOASTS BUT FAILS TO GIVE PROMISE OF REFORMS

Van Hertling Says Submarine Will Reach Its Aim

Calls on Germany For Another Large Sum For War—Little Consolation For The People Who Demand Voice in Affairs of Nation

Berlin, via London, Nov. 29.—Continuing his speech in the Reichstag, in which he announced Germany's readiness to enter into peace negotiations, Chancellor von Hertling, in a speech before the Reichstag today, called for another large sum for the war, and said that the submarine campaign was reaching its aim.

He said: "Submarine warfare against merchant ships exercises systematically its powerful and inevitable effect. It was and is the only thorough going means for carrying on against the superior power of our adversaries the economic war forced upon us. It directs itself against enemy tonnage and those voyaging in the enemy's service."

"The ships sunk will continually exceed the tonnage of those newly built. All observations give us unmistakable proof that the submarine war against merchant ships will reach its aim intended for it."

In asking the Reichstag for a new credit of 15,000,000,000 marks the chancellor alluded to extraordinary war experience which had called forth among all the German people consciousness and solidarity. Every member of the community, he said, was now aware that he was part of the great total of valuable members of the state, which they recognize quite peculiarly as their affair and possession.

The chancellor then spoke of the demand for reform and adjustment of political affairs. He said it was necessary to recognize what is right in this demand and to carry it through with a firm hand. He added: "One should particularly not be led astray by catch words nor slavishly imitate the institutions of other countries, but should do what is demanded by the actual needs of popular life and which correspond to the German spirit and German characteristics."

"Of the fundamental principles of our imperial constitution nothing can or shall be changed. They are distinctive and have given our people a sense of developed character of the German people and their various branches. Parliamentary representation in the Reichstag is a part of the German constitution."

"When our political life developing itself from this foundation understands that it is not a free expression of opinion and set aside abuses, the framework of the imperial constitution, the imperial government will at all times lend a willing ear to the wishes and suggestions which may reach it from this honorable house. . . Of that I am sure."

Count von Hertling contended that the initiative for Prussian reforms proceeded from the crown, and after alluding to some new bills or reform affecting the workmen's unions, referred to the censorship question and promised to do what was possible to allow free expression of opinion and set aside abuses.

He continued: "The point now is to achieve certain initial successes there. These, however, have no influence on the general situation from a military point of view. In the theatre of war in Asia Minor and in Iraq the situation is unchanged."

Says Navy's Work Great, Too.

After declaring that the German war fleet had thoroughly fulfilled the hopes and expectations placed in it, the chancellor continued:

"The high seas fleet, whose constant activity often has been veiled from the public view, deserves the thanks of the country. It has since its glorious day off the Skagerrak, lately shown anew, after a long interval, in the capture of the islands of Oesel, Dagoo and Moon in co-operation with the army and in its lately successful fight in the German Bight in the North Sea against a considerable superiority of forces, its constant readiness for battle. As a support and reserve it stands behind our submarine boats, it protects their places of support and opens out a way for them into the open sea."

Count von Hertling expressed the wish that the territories formerly under Russian sway—Poland, Lithuania and Courland—could have the thanks of the country. He said that affairs in this direction were still completely in a state of uncertainty, and that reports in the press indicating that a definite agreement had been reached on one point were premature.

He referred to Germany and her allies as having placed themselves on the foundation of the papal peace note of last August, and said that every ground had been removed for the "foolish argument" that the object of her enemies was to destroy German militarism, which was destroying the peace of nations, the said:

"It has been shown here, in truth, the peace destroying militarism can be sought. The Italian minister Sonnino, after the high seas fleet, whose constant activity often has been veiled from the public view, deserves the thanks of the country.
