CANADIAN GUIDE SHOWS THEM HOW

Gives a Demonstration at Palm Beach How to Throw Horseshoes.

Palm Beach, Fla., Feb. 14.—Since the gentle art of pitching horseshoes first came into vogue here, a little more than a week ago, there has been a general dearth of what is commonly known in the terminology of the game as "rings," especially in the Barnyard Golf Society of Palm Beach, among the members of which are J. Leonard Replogle, Gurnee Munn and A. J. Drexel, Jr. Mr. Replogle has been able to lay claim to three rings, all told, and other members admit that his record has not been surpassed. But while the society's regular contests were under way and horseshoes were falling everywhere except on the pines, Florens Ziegfeld appeared in a wheel chair with an aged man whom he introduced as a Canadian guide. The latter showed such interest in the game that he was invited to try his hand and promptly accepted. Two members of the club aided the newcomer, who leaned heavily on a knobby cane, to his position and a supply of horseshoes was stacked nearby. Then the guide began to pitch and ringer followed ringer until the peg was so crowded that it had to be cleared. The exhibition continued until 28 rings in succession were counted. The twenty-ninth missed the peg by a hair, but no further exhibition was required. Then it was discovered that the wizard of the art of horseshoe hurling had been discovered in the public park at West Palm Beach and had been invited to give the exhibition. "By the way," put in Mr. Replogle, turning to his position and a supply of horseshoes was stacked nearby. "are you going to enter the horseshoe pitching championships at Lake Worth next week?" "Now," was the modest reply, "them guys is too good. They'd skunk me."
