### NEW COMPETITION IN RIFLE SHOOTING

At Aldershot They are Trying Conditions of Actual Warfare.

Aldershot, Aug. 23.—(Associated Press by mail).—The complaint is made of rifle shooting competitions, not without reason, that they afford little practice in marksmanship under conditions that approximate those of actual warfare, and that proficiency in the kind of shooting that wins prizes is not the sort of shooting that is most needed to win battles. To meet this criticism the Company Cup competition was devised.

The idea underlying this competition is that an outpost of nine men, under a non-commissioned officer, is suddenly attacked by an equal number of hostile forces, represented by nine 12m. khaki discs, which appear over the top of a trench 200 yards away.
