AMALGAMATION
OF CITY PLANTS

Matter Suggested After the Mayor's Visit to South End Site.

Coal Company Plans Enlargement of Facilities—Claim for Damages Ordered Settled—Sketch Plan of Overhead Bridge Received—Proposed New East End Street.

A proposal to amalgamate the plants of the public works and the water and sewerage departments in the one area in South End, where now are situated the public works asphalt plant and other equipment, was suggested at the committee meeting of the common council by Mayor Schofield this morning. The suggestion was the result of His Worship's visit to the site yesterday.

He said that in his opinion the two departments might get together and work out some plan this year which might be put into effect within the next two or three years. The trackage at the lower end site would enable the water department to handle their heavy pipe more conveniently than at present.

Commissioner Frink said that at present his department had some \$100,000 worth of plant on the ground. He asked if a fire alarm box could not be installed there, as there was a great deal of inflammable material stored on the site.

Commissioner Thornton said that he would look into this matter and see what could be done. He thought in the interests of the city property and also for the convenience of the department, Commissioner Jones might consider the matter of enlarging the supply line.

More Building Lots.
Commissioner Bullock expressed the opinion that some other vacant lots in the vicinity of the asphalt plant might be acquired by the city to make room for the merging of the two departmental plants. The removal of the pipe yards from Leinster street, he thought, would make room for the sale by the city of some very desirable building lots in a good residential locality.

Dr. Frink again brought up the matter of an incinerator, remarking that the plan for the future should include such an apparatus. He spoke of the work accomplished by the City of Outremont in this connection and of his visit to the incinerator plant of that town last year.

Claim for Damages.
On recommendation of Commissioner Frink, it was decided to settle a claim made by Frank Gaudet for personal property damaged in his house at the corner of Lancaster and Rodney streets, west for \$87. The original claim was for \$119, and was for damage done by blasting operations carried on by the city in the vicinity of his home. The commissioner said that he had investigated the claim personally, and some of the items he thought excessive.

Proposed Reserved Street.
Commissioner Frink reported on the application of residents of Westmorland road and the Marsh road for the reservation of a street running through the Thomas Gilbert estate, what was known as the Fair Grounds. J. Roy Campbell, K. C., had reported that the representatives of the estate approved the idea. He read a report of the road engineer, who said that the level of the street would have to be raised from one to four feet and suggested that the city release from the cost of retaining walls if necessary.

On Dr. Frink's recommendation it was decided to accept and approve the plan, but to expend no money on the street until conveyance had been made by the estate to the city.

A letter was read from the Union of Canadian Municipalities asking the city to co-operate in opposition to a proposed bill by which the Vancouver, Fraser Valley and Southern Railway asked for a dominion charter to purchase the British Columbia Electric Co. and its subsidiaries. The matter was referred to the mayor.

To Commissioner Thornton was referred an application from Policeman Corbett, whose six months' leave of absence will expire on April 4, for an extension of six months on account of illness. He has been a member of the police and fire department for more than fifty years.

A Harbor Matter.
A letter was read from Alexander Gray, federal engineer in charge of St. John harbor, drawing the council's attention to the fact that, following every storm, material from the public dump in the east of Sydney street was washed into the harbor. He said that the department dredges were employed every year, dredging at both the government and city berths without cost to the city, and that the city should either take steps to prevent this material going into the harbor or abandon the dump.

The mayor reported that he visited the site yesterday and found that the tide had eaten into the bank and was undermining the surface.

The matter was referred to the commissioner of public works for report.

The mayor announced that a delegation of residents of East St. John would be before the committee on Thursday morning in connection with the matter of that territory being included in the city limits.

Enlarge Local Industries.
F. W. Blizard, of the Consumers Coal Co., asked for a lease of beach or flats adjoining lower cove slip for the handling of hard coal coming in by water and to be sent from here by rail. He said that much of this coal had been coming during the past to northern New Brunswick by rail. This might come through St. John. He said present equipment would take care of this business and he asked for another lot south of their present site to provide for the erection of discharging apparatus and deepening of the dock to take larger vessels. The area required was about 100x140, of which space was not available, an area 100x70 would be necessary.

To the mayor, Mr. Blizard said he understood the C. N. R. had been contemplating using this area for some time. The matter was referred to Commis-

Among the cabin passengers will be Madame Albert Liebrecht, who is attached to the Belgium Consulate in Quebec; Mr. and Mrs. George Menier, of Halifax, and Mrs. H. J. Rowe, of Montreal, who is to accompany the body of her husband to Southampton.

NEW LITERARY CLUB.

The Welsford Literary Club has been organized with the following officers: President, Rev. E. Rowland; vice-president, Rev. J. R. Belyea; secretary, Joseph Bruston; programme committee, Mrs. J. R. Belyea, Miss Martha Clewitt, and Roy Cooper. After a discussion of literary questions at the last meeting Mr. Gordon, visitor of the evening, gave a short address touching on the necessity of such a club and the benefits to be derived from it.

DEATH OF CHILD.

Friends will be sorry to learn of the death of Margaret Rowena, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Brown, 314 Pike street, West End, which occurred this morning.

Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Shields, 50 Waterloo street, will be sorry to learn of the death of their only child, Marguerite, age two years and three months, which occurred on Saturday, due to pneumonia.

LIQUOR CASES.

Three raids were made by the liquor inspectors on Saturday evening in three parts of the city. In Campbell's beer shop in Prince Edward street they report seizing a quantity of whiskey; in the shop of James Quinn in Main street, some beer or ale, alleged to be stronger than is allowed by law, and on the West Side, in the room of Martin Wilcox in a boarding house in Union street a gallon and a half of gin. Charges will be laid.

COMMERCIAL CLUB AND HYDRO.

The Commercial Club tonight will consider the resolution on hydro that was prepared by a special committee and passed on by the executive for discussion by the club. The substance of the resolution is that the city should, without delay, get an estimate of the cost per kilowatt hour to the consumer of light and power through civic distribution. This course was recommended by the committee because of the great spread in cost between the Ross and other estimates thus far submitted.

MEN'S MISSION OPENED.

The mission for married women conducted in the Cathedral last week by the Passionist Fathers was brought to a close on Sunday afternoon at a most impressive service conducted by Rev. Father Mark. The mission for married men was opened by Rev. Father Bede on Sunday evening with a very large assemblage. He spoke on the purpose of life, and gave a powerful address. The masses for the men are at 5.30 and 7 a.m., and the evening service at 7.30. Following the married men's mission there will be a week for the single women and a week for the single men.

Commissioner Bullock and the harbor master for inspection and report.

Property Matters.
Patrick H. Gorman asked for renewal of his lease of a lot in Princess street. Referred to Commissioner Bullock.

L. W. Simms presented an offer of \$1,400 for four lots in the town planning area in Lancaster. Referred to Commissioner Bullock and the city engineer for report.

Daniel Murphy of Fairville applied for purchase of a lot now leased to him in Fairville, offering \$350. He was paying \$30 a year for his lease. Mr. Bullock promised to report on the matter. Edward S. Raymond applied on behalf of Maurice L. Doherty for the purchase of a lot in Princess street of which he was sub-lessee. The matter was referred to Commissioner Bullock for report.

Commissioner Jones read a letter from the superintendent of the Provincial Hospital, saying that the water in the wells at the asylum annex was becoming contaminated and he asked that a 6 in. pipe be laid to the building from the Manawagonish Road. Mr. Jones said he thought the government would pay the expense. He agreed to report later.

Commissioner Frink asked for permission to obtain a supply of asphalt for this season's work. He said about sixty tons were left from about 300 tons purchased last year. On his motion it was decided to call for tenders for 175 tons.

Mayor and Hydro.
The mayor said when he was away last week he met R. Ross and took up with him the proposed contract with the hydro-electric commission and this morning received some suggestions from him in that connection. It was decided to take the matter up later.

His Worship said that he now understood the city was offered the power at a guaranteed price instead of at actual cost as was understood formerly.

The mayor said Mr. Ross looked very seriously upon the matter of erecting a distribution system in addition to the present system.

The Overhead Bridge.
The mayor presented a sketch of the proposed overhead bridge in Douglas avenue, prepared by the engineering department of the C. P. R. at Montreal. J. M. Woodman, C. P. R. superintendent asked the council to approve one copy of the sketch and return it to the C. P. R.

The mayor said he would report further.

The commissioner of safety was authorized to have the ice removed from North and South Market streets. It would cost about \$200 he said, to be paid for out of market revenue.


