## HALIFAX SHIPPING

eturns For Last Year Show a Re-duction in Tonnage.

In the annual returns of the registrar of shipping for-Halifax for the year 1920 as compiled by Fred W. Meyer, assistant registrar for The Morning Chronicle, shows number of registrations at this port during year 224, or a total of 424, against which were reductions through wrecks, broken up and transferred to other ports 116, leaving a total of 308 vessels on the registration books of Halifax for the year 1920. Rising and Judge Forbes were appointed a committee to lay the claims of the Order before the organizations to which it had been decided to apply for assistance.

Particular reasons given for the close down, coming presumally fichathe management, are prohibitive wages, shorter work day than similar establishments, and the fact that this plant is the only "union shop" of its kind in the world (?) It is news to the employees of this plant, speaking generally, that their wages were any higher than wages paid some similar industries in our own city. Reference is also made to certain market conditions and the trend of events regarding working conditions possible in certain sections of the industrial world.




