

Gold Watches Presented by the City to D. T. Thompson and Martin Wilcox for Saving Life — The Story of 'Their Deeds.

Commissioner Fisher reported that he had found it necessary to withhold payment of accounts from several of the city blacksmiths for horseshoeing for the public works department since a new schedule of rates came into force on April 1 because, he said, the charges for certain portions of the work were at higher rates than the blacksmiths collected for shoeing horses for merchants and others.
