## NO PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS YET

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 10.—The government was in final session this evening and was expected to arise early tomorrow morning, and the members will return to their homes tomorrow.

Premier Foster announced tonight that returned officer, Lieutenant George B. Hallett, M. C. of Sussex, has been recommended by the executive council to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor for registration of deeds, Kings county, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Fred. M. Sproule.

An appointment which has been contemplated for more than a year, but which was postponed until the end of the war, is that of Fred. E. Sharp of Springfield, Kings county, as superintendent of immigration. The organization in the government offices in St. John will look after the sale of marriage licenses, game licenses, probate court stamps and the distribution of acts of legislation, frequently inquired for by the public.

Premier Foster, speaking tonight, concerning the rumors of a general election in the province, said that the matter has never been considered by the government, and stated further that the present legislature is not yet two years' old, and by law has still three years to run.

The dominion government has been giving consideration to the proposal of the dominion government for grants to the province for better housing. Plans are being worked out to secure part of the money for New Brunswick.

It is proposed to open labor bureaus in this province in Moncton, St. John, Fredericton and possibly at a point on the North Shore in co-operation with the federal government.

When asked about the date for the opening of the legislature, Premier Foster said that it had not been determined and that it depended on the speed with which the public accounts were prepared. Influenza has seriously interfered with their preparation.

The premier made an important announcement in connection with his own constituency of Victoria. He said that

plans had been approved for a modern flour mill to be established at Perth by J. D. Porter. The mill is to have a capacity of fifty barrels a day.

### PLAN MEMORIAL

The semi-annual meeting of the alumni of the University of New Brunswick was held last evening in the Pugsley Building. Plans were discussed for the erection of a memorial building in honor of all the students who enlisted and especially for those who had given their lives for the cause. Chancellor C. C. Jones of the university was present and outlined plans for the proposed building. The university senate, the alumni and the alumnae are co-operating in raising the funds. They propose to raise \$75,000. During the evening a discussion took place regarding the pay of the professors, and a hope was expressed that the government would give an increased grant so that they would be able to get an increase. It was decided to send the university monthly to all the graduates and undergraduates who are at present overseas. Fifty dollars was voted for this purpose. A publicity committee consisting of Dr. W. W. White, E. W. McCredy, Miss Hunter and Chancellor Jones was appointed, at a meeting in the afternoon, to promote the memorial campaign.

### NO PROSPECT OF BREAK-UP IN GOVERNMENT.

Hon. J. A. Calder, chairman of the re-organization committee of the dominion government, speaking at the Canadian Club in Toronto yesterday, denied that there were any indications of "break up" of the union government.

### NEWS OF SOLDIERS.

Word has been received in the city that Lieutenant Donald A. MacDonald, of St. John, has been repatriated a prisoner of war and has arrived in London. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Tracey have received word that their son, Private Tracey, who has been a prisoner of war in Germany for two years, is now in Germany.

W. F. Stevens who left here as quartermaster-sergeant with the 140th Battalion, was due to leave England for home on January 4. A brother, C. H. Stevens, Jr., who went overseas with the 9th Sgt. Battery, is expected to arrive later on.

The death is announced at Wilton (N. B.) of Alexander F. Bremner, of Jamaica Plain, Boston. Mr. Bremner was head of the Boston Engineering Co. He was born in Chatham (N. B.). He is survived by his wife, a daughter, Miss Catherine, and a son, Frederick. Edward Bremner, of Vancouver, is a brother.

### ENDORSE PROHIBITORY ACT

Fredericton, Jan. 10.—York county council, this afternoon, increased the grant to Victoria Hospital from \$500 to \$1,000. By an unanimous vote, Chief Inspector W. D. Wilson and the provincial prohibition act were heartily endorsed and the opinion expressed that prohibition should be permanent policy of New Brunswick. A resolution was passed to the effect that the provincial government should amend the game act so as to permit the sale of game animals killed by resident hunters.

If the mother is sick, someone is needed to nurse her, look after the children, scrub floors, perhaps provide the very food that is eaten.
