650 MINERS CAUGHT IN GERMAN MINE

Disaster Follows Fire Damp Explosion—Only a Few Rescued—Seven of Dead Bodies Recovered

Bouchun, Germany, Aug. 8.—Six hundred and fifty miners were imprisoned today in the Lorraine pit of the coal field of which the centre is the village of Gerthe, about four miles from this city. The day shift of 600 men had just descended into the workings and were distributing themselves along the various levels when a series of fire damp explosions occurred. The detonation was heard at the surface, and the officials on duty immediately formed rescue parties who rushed back to the pit mouth together with the villagers. Eight injured were brought to the surface.
