NOMINATIONS FOR FUTURITY OF 1925 ARE INCREASED TO 1,499

New York, Jan. 12—Entries received through the mails by the Westchester Aacing Association increased the total for the Futurity, the two-year-old turf classic to be run in 1925 at Belmont Park, to 1,499. Among the late arrivals of nominations were those of Adolph Spreckels of California. He named ten marcs, bred mostly to Runnymede, the sire of Morvich. Further entries from Rudolph Spreckels and

others on the Coast are expected today. These additionel ones will probably swell the grand total well beyond the 1,500 mark. The present entry of 1,499 is 109 more than was received for the juvenile classic when it closed a year ago for its running in 1924 and 100 more than the highest recorded in any other year. Nominations by the Nursery Stud were forty-seven instead of twenty-seven, the latter number having been announced as official through an error in transcription. This total lifts the well-known Kentucky establishment well up on the list of patrons for the greatest two-year-old prizes. These forty-seven dams have been mated with Fair Play, Hourless, Man-o'-War and other sires which Major August Belmont deemed worthy of patronage.


