Fire and Water.—Those who wish to test the relation between fire and water may easily do so by the following cheap and simple process:—Put some water into a bottle, and also some iron filings; in a short time the iron will separate the water into its two elements, by attracting the oxygen to itself, and setting free the hydrogen. As this latter escapes from the bottle through a small tube fixed in the cork, it will take fire, if a candle or match be applied to the escaping gas. Thus fire may be produced from water. If a little sulphuric acid be added to the water, this will cause the hydrogen to form with rapidity, and tend to the more complete success of the experiment.
