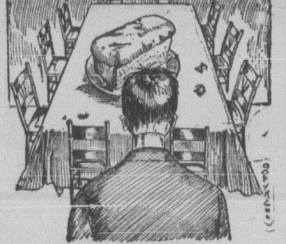

ASTRONOMERS IN LABRADOR.

Observation Parties Sent to See Eclipse
By Canada and the Lick Obser-
vatory Unsuccessful.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 2.—The Lick
Astronomical Observatory expedition
which went to Cartwright, Labrador, to
observe the solar eclipse of Wednesday
last, met with complete failure. Heavy
fog, rain and clouds of the heavens
during the entire period of eclipse, and
the result of the attempted observations
was so unsatisfactory that the astron-
omers will not even attempt to develop
the photographic plates which were ex-
posed.

The report of the failure of the mis-
sion was brought here yesterday by
Governor MacGregor, who had accom-
panied the expedition to Cartwright, and
who returned here yesterday on the
warship Seyla.

Fears Canada is in Same Boat.
The Governor said he feared also that
the expedition sent out by the Cana-
dian Government, which was located at
Hamilton, only about fifty miles from
Cartwright, was fully as unfortunate as
those from Lick.

Early morning conditions last Wed-
nesday were very favorable for obser-
vation of the heavens, the governor
said, and every preparation had been
made for the work, which was to begin
about 8 a. m. Before that hour, how-
ever, thick clouds had rolled in, and
during the whole period of totality of
the eclipse the heavens were obscured.

London, Sept. 2.—Prof. Wm. Joseph
Russey of the Lick Observatory expedi-
tion cables to the Associated Press
from Assiut, Egypt, that the expedi-
tion executed its eclipse program as
planned. The elongates were in the
form of streamers of the fish-tail type
with marked rays from the sun spot
zones, especially from the southeast
and north. The streamers distinctly
reappeared. Prominences were pronoun-
ced, especially those near the North Pole.
The outlines of the shadow bands were
determined.

EMBARGO IS TO STAY.

Britain's Reply to Request of Cana-
dian Government.

Ottawa, Sept. 2.—The Dominion
Government has received a reply from
the Imperial authorities in answer to
the request to remove the embargo on
Canadian cattle. The British Govern-
ment, on a report of the British Board
of Agriculture, has declined to do so.

The report of the British Board of
Agriculture sets forth that the embar-
go is no obstacle in promoting the
trade in cattle between the colonies
and foreign countries and Britain.

The embargo has been in existence
since 1879.

PASS YELLOW JACK CRISIS.

Campaign of Science Against Yellow
Jack Ends In Success.

New Orleans, Sept. 2.—Signed state-
ments of all the leaders in the fever
fight, indicating that the crisis has passed,
that the campaign of science is suc-
cessful, and that the fever will be practi-
cally forgotten by frost, were printed here
yesterday.
