In answer to a question by a correspondent, the Trade Review gives the following answer:—  
**Number of Sticks**  
In answer to the above enquiry, we beg to say that a cord of wood of the size required for pit props, would be about equal to one hundred sticks, eight feet in length and about the size of an ordinary fence post. These sticks, in order to fit the specification, will have to be partly rinded and will have to be sawed square on the ends. All sorts of prices are named at present, and all sorts of people are talking of contracting. But nothing very definite can be said to this writing, beyond stating that men interested in the business will no doubt soon be visiting likely spots in the outports to make arrangements for getting the timber cut.
