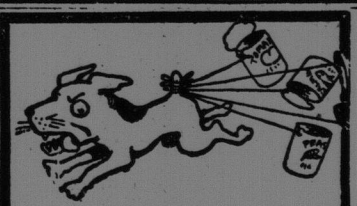

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.

SAD DROWNING AT ANNAPOLIS

ANNAPOLIS, N. S. July 8.—A drowning accident occurred here about noon today by which Cecil Jordan, aged eleven years, lost his life. A number of small boys were playing on a raft that was lying off the ferry slip, and in some way the raft tipped up, throwing young Jordan into the water. The other boys were too frightened to do anything and valuable time was lost before their cries attracted the attention of a sailor on one of the ships lying in the harbor, who dove over after the drowning boy, but was unable to locate him. A number of persons were attracted to the scene and the body was found about ten minutes after the accident occurred. Every means was used to revive the boy, but after working over him for some time doctors pronounced life to be extinct.

COMPANY PAYS FOR UNIFORMS OF MEN

TORONTO, July 8.—A somewhat unexpected turn was given to the controversy between the management and the men of the Toronto Railway Company over the matter of uniforms, when some of the motormen and conductors on opening their pay envelopes today found a refund for uniforms which they had purchased, as they claimed, contrary to their rights. It is believed that any other questions that stand between the men and management now can be easily settled. The men have one complaint, that spotters are on too many cars, but this can be easily adjusted.

GOV'T. POLICIES ARE ATTACKED

Opposition Meeting at Ben Lomond

SEVERAL SPEAKERS

They included E. H. McAlpine, A. B. Copp and E. S. Carter

Ben Lomond turned out in force last night to hear the record of the present provincial administration criticised, and a large number gathered at the Ben Lomond House to take part in a meeting held in the interests of A. F. Bentley, the opposition candidate in the forthcoming county by-election.

A. F. Johnson presided at the meeting. The speakers were E. H. McAlpine, Councillor Donovan, A. B. Copp, M. P. P., and E. S. Carter. Mr. McAlpine spoke particularly of the road act and how impossible it was for the county officials, including the road superintendent, to do anything for upwards of an hour. Mr. McAlpine also spoke of the efforts of the Hazen government to induce Liberals to support them and referred to the drastic treatment meted out to Liberal office holders since Hazen came into power. He said that if Mr. Hazen and his party should secure any victory they would forget any assistance given them by the Liberals and would herald it throughout all Canada as a Conservative victory. Mr. McAlpine covered many of the issues which are allied with federal politics and spoke for upwards of an hour. Mr. McAlpine was warmly applauded upon resuming his seat.

Councillor Donovan in a very brief speech, made his position on the highway question very clear. He took the opportunity of thanking the people of Simonds for supporting him so often and said that he would do anything in his power as a member of the highway board to give them good roads. His statement, however, repeatedly made that there was not a cent of money at this moment at the disposal of the highway board, was absolutely true and he challenged contradictory Mr. Copp spoke for upwards of an hour and arranged the government for its extravagance, for its false promises in regard to highway legislation and for its failure to really save the people anything in the purchase of school books. Touching this latter question he showed conclusively that directly and indirectly the school books upon which the government claimed to be saving a saving of about 40 per cent, costing the people some 15 or 20 per cent more than under the old government.

He also showed when speaking of the finances of the province that the estimated expenditure for 1909 was \$225,000. More than it was in 1907 and charged Mr. Hazen with breaking his pledge to give the people a less expensive administration. In scathing terms he denounced the government's vacillation in respect to highway legislation, and showed how Mr. Hazen's first act in his first session was to introduce a new highway act and his last act in his second session was to repeal and amend this same act, which he had never dared to do before. He was frequently applauded and concluded a most eloquent speech by asking all present to support Mr. Bentley on election day.

Regular meetings with a large attendance continue to be held at Camp Beulah.

Yesterday services opened at 6 a. m. with prayer by Rev. Mr. Ruth. At 9 a. m. the social service was conducted by Licentiate M. S. Baisdel, B.A., followed at 10.30 with Bible reading by Rev. Mr. Ruth.

A business session of the alliance was held at 1.30 p. m., at which many important matters were discussed.

During the meeting a resolution was passed appointing a committee to institute and establish a fund known as the "Ministers' Relief Fund for Aged and Disabled Ministers."

It was also resolved that the executive, in conjunction with Joseph Bullock and J. F. Bullock be a committee to carry to completion the improvements already commenced on the grounds and the erection of a new hotel this season—the old hotel to be used for sleeping quarters.

A hearty vote of thanks was then tendered Mr. J. F. Bullock for his interest in the work of beautifying Beulah camp grounds, and also to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bullock for the gift of \$1000 for Home Mission, which makes a magnificent total of \$2,500 given by this charitable cause.

It was decided that the following men be continued on license for another year: M. S. Baisdel, B.A., Ira deWitt Long, P. C. Wright, Leonard Sabean, Hartley Mullin and William Howe.

It was also resolved that S. H. Clarke and Smith Dow, of Woodstock, be granted licenses.

At 1.30 p. m. Rev. D. Sanders conducted another service in the parlors of the hotel. At 2.30 Rev. Mr. Ruth preached.

A meeting of the general missionary board was held at 4.30 and much business transacted.

At 7.30 last evening Rev. Mr. Ruth conducted the services before a large congregation.

Many people are coming and going daily and the attendance is much larger than in previous years.

SUDDEN DEATH OF ZEBULON RICHARDS

Zebulon Richards, one of the most prominent and successful residents of the parish of Greenwich, Kings County, expired suddenly at his home, Oak Bay, about 4 o'clock yesterday morning.

Mr. Richards was about as usual the day before and retired at night apparently in very good health. Shortly before four o'clock in the morning he was discovered breathing heavily and before medical aid could be summoned passed away.

Mr. Richards was born in the parish of Greenwich a little over seventy-seven years ago. He married a Mrs. Carpenter of Wickham, Queens Co. who survives him. He is also survived by one daughter, the wife of Councillor Walton of the parish of Greenwich.

Mr. Richards was a farmer by occupation and the owner of one of the largest and most productive farms in the parish. He was a staunch Liberal all his life and a member of the Anglican Church.

The funeral will take place Saturday morning at 10 a. m. from the late residence of the deceased.
