
UPSETTING REMINDER

FRASER COMPANY REORGANIZATION PLAN APPROVED

Noteholders Vote 8 to 1 For Ratification After Lengthy Meeting. Montreal, July, 21. — Noteholders of the Fraser Companies, Limited, tonight ratified the proposed plan of reorganization of the company by a vote of approximately eight to one.

Opposition to the ratification was led by a recently formed noteholders' protective committee. The noteholders were asked to approve the exchange of \$5,000,000 15-year 6 1/2% unsecured debentures of the Fraser Company, for common shares.

The shares are to be represented by voting trust certificates issued in accordance with the scheme at the rate of two common shares for each \$100 held in debentures.

Bondholders and other securities are to meet next week to consider whether or not to ratify the plan insofar as it affects their holdings.

The meeting lasted for several hours. The noteholders' protective committee pressed for delay until further information could be obtained. It was stated that no information was available as to the company's operations since the start of 1932.

It was estimated during the day that the committee had lined up \$427,000 worth of bonds against the reorganization. One-quarter of the total amount outstanding would have been necessary to back the plan from being ratified. A number of private conferences were understood to have taken place during the dinner adjournment.

Tonight the matter was put to a vote, the ratification being authorized.

THE STATEMENT OF THE RESIGNING C. N. CHAIRMAN

Issued by Sir Henry Thornton upon tendering his resignation, effective August 1st.

Montreal, — Sir Henry Thornton Chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways, has placed his resignation in the hands of the Board of Directors of the System. It is understood that Sir Henry requested that his resignation be effective from August 1st, 1932. At the close of the meeting of the Board of Directors it was announced that Mr. S. J. Hungerford, Operating Vice-President of the Railway, had been appointed by the board Acting President.

"I have had under consideration my railway situation which has arisen largely by reason of published criticism of the expenditures of the Canadian National Railways during my regime. I feel it is only fair to point out that capital expenditures were only made after careful consideration by myself and the chief officers of the company, and represented our views of what was necessary for the welfare of the enterprise. These expenses were, of course, controllable by the Government, I, however, feel that the successful operation of this enterprise can only be carried on if the country as a whole is heartily behind the management, and in view of this and the possibility of the Government's interference in the future, I feel that, in order to give them a free hand, I should submit my resignation.

"In leaving the service of the Canadian National Railways I especially desire to thank the officers and the men with whom I have been associated for nearly ten years for the loyalty, enthusiasm and ability which all have given with a generous hand to the enterprise and myself. I shall always cherish the happiest recollections of my contact with those in the service of the Company, and I may add with truth that whatever has been accomplished has been largely due to the co-operative spirit displayed by all, from the highest to the lowest.

"I am quite certain that the same devotion to duty and the high principles which have characterized both management and men during my incumbency in office will be extended with equal fidelity to the succeeding administration.

"I bid you all farewell; I wish to you happiness and prosperity with the hope that the future will bring to you that good fortune which fine service merits."

FARMS RETAIN BUYING POWER

The long drought is broken on the prairies, the mixed crops of Ontario are universally excellent, and the approach of harvest finds the farming community of Canada with heads up and confidence in the future. The farmer's buying power has not depreciated nearly as much as some people think, in spite of low prices for his produce, and this is especially true in Ontario, according to Hon. T. L. Kennedy, minister of agriculture for that province. Hon. Mr. Kennedy, in a recent public address, cited the prompt payment of farm mortgage money as proof. The Ontario Government, he said, held a million dollars in farm mortgages, principal and interest, that was about due. Before the due date, \$600,000 was paid all in cash. As a further indication of the stability of farmers' finances, he mentioned the large holdings of Victory bonds and the increasing total of bank deposits.
