A special meeting of the Evangelical Alliance was called for yesterday afternoon for the purpose of passing a strong resolution protesting against the Sunday train which is proposed to have leave St. John during the months of July and August.

At the opening of the meeting the president, Rev. James Crisp, spoke of the purpose for which the meeting had been called, and Rev. A. Graham stated that Mr. Pottinger, of the I. R. C., had stated in reply to an interviewer that in a probability the I. R. C. would have a Sunday train from here, but Hon. H. R. Emmer, son had intimated that the sentiment of the people did not favor a Sunday train.
