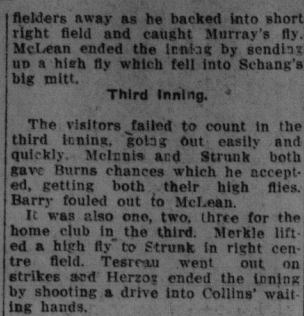


THE HEAVY HITTING ATHLETICS TAKE THIRD GAME IN WORLD SERIES

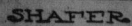

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**SUFFRAGETTES EXPLO
ARE SHOCKED DIS**

**Announcement that Only
Minor Offences Come Under
"Cat and Morin Act"
Upsets Plans.**

London, Oct. 9.—The belief of the militant incendiaries that under the "cat and mouse" act they were assured of speedy release from prison "hunger" strikes, and that they could repeat their offence, received a rude shock today by the announcement of the home secretary that Miss May Sticksell, who has been in prison since October 4 on the charge of arson, and who has been refusing food since her arrest, would not be given another reprieve. She is said to have been instructed to resort to forcible feeding. If necessary, to prevent the incendiaries from starving themselves to death.

The Home Secretary says that the act will continue to be applied as heretofore, to minor offences, but that it will not be applied to acts of serious violence.
