Kings County, New Brunswick,
March 31st, A. D. 1920.

To Mr. and Mrs. Elkanah Hall:
Dear Parents,—Fifty years ago to-

parents' roof, you were married

Twelve children were born to you.
In that time Death visited most
homes, parents have been bereft,
their children, children of their par-

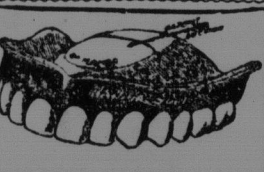
