

LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE AGREE TO NUMBER OF BILLS

Members of Assembly Now Down to Work, Rushing Bills Through the Hopper With Characteristic Last Days Speed.

Assembly Chamber, Fredericton, N. B., April 7.—The House met at twelve o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Michaud presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Notices of enquiry were given for Wednesday next as follows:

By Mr. Young, for Mr. Stewart, as to the purchase of lumber at Happort, Kent county, in 1921 for a bridge at Beaton.

By Mr. Pinder—As to the dismissal of Fred P. Robinson from the post of Secretary of the Board of Public Utilities Commission; also as to the dismissal of J. Herbert Maxwell from the position of Accountant in the Comptroller General's office.

By Mr. Hunter—As to amounts paid to Charles H. McDermott, road supervisor for the Parish of Northfield, Sackville County.

By Mr. Smith (Albert)—for Mr. D'Estes—As to the number of editions of the elementary history of Canada by P. F. Bourgeois, purchased by the Government and the price of the same.

Hon. Mr. Veniot moved that the fees paid on a bill relating to school rates in the county of Gloucester be refunded, the bill having been withdrawn.

Hon. Mr. Robinson introduced a bill to authorize a grant of certain lands in the County of St. John and Charlotte to His Majesty the King as represented by the Dominion Government for wharf building purposes.

The House then went into committee with Mr. F. F. F. in the chair, and agreed to bills to enable the Municipality of Gloucester to borrow \$34,000; to enable the Common Council of St. John to grant a superannuation to Herbert B. Wardroper, Common Clerk; and to authorize the School Trustees of the Parish of Madawaska to issue debentures.

It being one o'clock the house took recess until 3 p.m.

The committee, on resuming at 3 o'clock, agreed to bills relating to the village of Robbsey; to amend the Municipalities Act relating to the town of Newcastle; to authorize the town of Moncton, and an Act to enable the Board of School Trustees of the city of Moncton to issue debentures.

The committee next went into consideration of a bill relating to the town of Campbellton and some amendments thereto, recommended by the Municipalities Committee. The bill asks authority to issue debentures to the amount of two hundred and thirty-five thousand dollars.

Mr. Martin, having approved of the issue of debentures by a plebiscite and also at the civic elections subsequently held, had a right to know why the bill had been amended.

Mr. Richards said he understood that the promoters of the bill favored the amendment as it stood. He had personally drafted the amendment at the request of one of the members for Restigouche.

Mr. Hayes said that the amendment was based on the recommendation of the members for Restigouche. He was not aware that any question had been raised as to the illegality of the plebiscite.

Mr. Martin said that the change had been made in the bill without the town authorities of Campbellton having been consulted. This did not seem

to him to be right.

The House again went into committee with Mr. Michaud in the chair and agreed to bills relating to the village of St. John, an Act relating to the St. John Protestant Orphan Home; an Act relating to St. Andrew's Society of St. John; an Act to amend an Act for the incorporation of the St. John Mission Society of the port of St. John; an Act to incorporate the Soldier's Memorial Hall Association at Petitcodiac; an Act to authorize the Roman Catholic Bishop of Chatham to borrow and to mortgage certain lands in the parish of Colborne, County of Restigouche; an Act to amend an Act to incorporate the New Brunswick Association of Graduate Nurses; an Act to authorize the City of Fredericton to grant certain concessions to the Chestnut Cane Company, Ltd.

The committee next took up consideration of a bill to fix the valuation for assessment purposes of T. S. Simms, Limited.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that this bill affected school taxes. Two years ago the House passed a resolution that no exemption of school taxes should be given. No city should seek the right to give such exemption.

The city of Fredericton had not sought to grant such a concession in the bill immediately preceding. He knew that in case of Fredericton, there was no county school fund which would be affected, even if the exemption had been allowed, but in the case of St. John there was a county school fund. Those who had been crying out that the maximum salaries for teachers was imposing an additional burden of taxation upon the people, brought in such a bill. He wished the Committee to give careful consideration to the matter.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that the promoter of the bill was not present, but on his behalf he would say that the exemption was sought. The object of the bill was to fix valuation for assessment and that valuation had been placed a figure higher than had been fixed by the assessors. The school fund really had been increased by the bill.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said he could not agree with the Hon. member. How could anyone say what a Board of Assessors would do. The bill, as it stood, certainly would interfere with the school tax. The resolution which the Public had passed two years before had been definite. What was the use of passing such resolution and allowing it to be disregarded by certain municipalities. There was another bill of a similar nature relating to the Cornwall and York Mills, Limited. The object was merely to grant exemption from taxation in a slightly altered form.

Hon. Mr. Roberts said that the promoter was absent and the Hon. member had raised an objection, it might be well to report progress and ask for leave to sit again, and moved to that effect.

The committee then took up consideration of a bill to fix valuation for assessment purposes of the Cornwall and York Mills, Limited, St. John.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said he would propose an amendment that the valuation for purposes of school assessment should not be as affected by the bill.

Hon. Mr. Roberts said that the bill had been agreed to by the City of St. John, and a valuation of half a million dollars placed on behalf of the company. The question of school taxes had been fully discussed. He appreciated the attitude of the Hon. Minister of Public Works in protecting the school system, but in view of the fact that the City of St. John assumed no change in regard to water rates. He had been fighting these attempts to exempt from school taxation for twenty years. There never had been an occasion on which he had not fought such a bill, and he would do it as long as he had the breath of life. He had fought the largest industry in his own town on just that point. He would oppose, even if he had to follow the example of his friend, Mr. Potts, and speak until His Honor the Lieutenant Governor arrived.

Mr. Hayes said that the principle of refusing to grant exemption of school rates was a good one and should be generally applied. But, if it was applied to the school rates, it had been granted to other municipalities. St. John should have same. Let this be stood over with the other bill.

He said that ever since he entered the House in 1917 this question had come up. The only way was for the House to turn down such bills. Hon. members must be consistent and stand by the resolution. Perhaps it would be just as well to acquiesce to the wishes of the Hon. Member for St. John City (Hayes) and report progress.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that trouble in this connection was caused by certain measures being allowed to slip through the House without their meaning being known. There had been one bill from Bathurst to which a certain meaning had been attached before the Committee, but afterwards the meaning was entirely different.

Mr. Richards said that the Hon. Minister of Public Works would have strong support in this matter. He did not know how the House could take any other stand but to refuse the granting of exemption from school taxes. The one and only way to deal with the bill was to refuse requests of this character.

Hon. Mr. Roberts said that the principle, if it had been generally adopted, should be applied to all such bills upon presentation.

Progress was reported on the bill. The committee reported bills as agreed to.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor entered the chamber and gave assent to a number of bills.

Mr. King presented the second report of the Committee on Contingencies.

Hon. Mr. Michaud, on behalf of Mr. Stewart, introduced a bill relating to the Restigouche and Bay Chaleur Memorial Hospital.

Hon. Mr. Foster introduced a bill to provide for the payment of the floating debt of the province. He explained that it provided for the issue of serial bonds for the payment of \$20,000 a year.

Hon. Mr. Michaud gave notice of motion for Tuesday next praying that His Honor the Lieutenant Governor cause to be laid before the House copies of all correspondence and telegrams to or from the Director of Technical Education with regard to the New School House at Edmundston.

Adjourned at 5.22 p.m. until 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Officer Bettle Clear of Charge

Seven Policemen Testify in His Favor—Max Schechter Was Fined.

Seven policemen testified in the police court yesterday that they had not observed any signs of drinking or intoxication on Flaminiotheman Bettle last Saturday night or on Sunday morning, although each of them had met him and spoken to him several times during that time.

The officers were called by the plaintiff's lawyer to rebut the evidence given by Max Schechter, charged with keeping his second-hand store open before hours and who when reported by Officer Bettle had informed the court that the officer had shown signs of drinking when he visited his shop.

Magistrate Ritchie reviewed the evidence that had been adduced at a previous hearing. He censured the defendant for his assertion regarding Officer Bettle, and stated that in view of the evidence produced he would find the defendant guilty and impose a fine of \$20, which was paid.

K. A. Wilson appeared for Schechter. The officers who testified for the prosecution were Sergeant Sullivan, Policemen Kilian, O'Rha, Hanna, Coy, Gaudet, Garnett and McParlane.

Louis Cowey was fined \$10 for exceeding the speed limit on Sunday, March 19. The fine was paid.
