Macadam, May 25.—The funeral of the late Mr. Lake Lawson took place Monday morning. There was a short service at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. B. Johnston, with whom he had made his home for many years.

The body was then taken by train to Sackville, where it was interred in the Methodist Church, where hosts of friends had gathered to pay their last tribute of respect to one whom they had known so well.

W. Hatfield, pastor of the Union Church, conducted the service, and was assisted by Rev. C. F. Flewelling, rector of the Anglican Church; Rev. Mr. Fitzpatrick, of the Methodist Church; and Rev. Mr. Hatfield, of the Baptist Church, Canterbury.

Loving hands had placed many beautiful flowers in the church and the choir sang very sweetly and reverently, "One by One," and "Will There Be Light." The flag on the school house floated at half-mast as a token of respect to him who had been a first teacher in this place.

Mr. Lawson went to Canterbury (then known as Howard Settlement) when a lad of sixteen, to teach the public school, and in all the years he lived there as teacher and merchant.

He was known as a "man among men," and held in the highest esteem for his sterling qualities and unimpeachable character. He represented the parish of Canterbury at the Municipal Council for twenty-eight consecutive years. In 1888 he returned to Macadam where he had accepted a position in the Customs, in which capacity he served for twenty-five years, being superannuated two years ago, and leaves to mourn three sons and four daughters: Wm. P. and Arthur, of Macadam; John of Minneapolis; Mrs. J. B. Johnston, Mrs. George J. Green and Mrs. Wilfred Burn of Macadam; and Mrs. M. H. Goodspeed of Ottawa.
