

WILL PROVINCE GRANT FURTHER AID?

GRAVE QUESTIONS WHICH CONFRONT THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT

General Belief That Flemming Will Not Dare to Guarantee More Bonds Till Good Gives Particulars of Money Expended—Surprise at Inaction of St. John Regarding Project of Such Vital Interest to the City.

Fredericton, March 20.—The Valley railway matter still has the centre of the stage, and everybody is asking what will be the outcome of it for the government. Mr. Gould, and last but not least, the people of New Brunswick.

It is learned here now that a number of members of the legislature visited Ottawa recently to take soundings about a whole matter, having become alarmed of the situation that is developing.

It is regarded as unreasonable to ask for a further guarantee of bonds, and it is certain that there will be increasing objection and a growing demand for particulars as to expenditures up-to-date, as to the route below Gagetown and above Centerville, and as to the time and method of completing the St. John-Valley section.

It is being said that the legislature will not dare commit the province to further expenditure until all the cards are on the table and until it is known with certainty that the Grand Trunk Pacific is coming to the route and the valley line within a certain time.

Friends of Mr. Gould are saying that he has the government in a hole. It is stated that he will be asked to resign against the government if the contract is cancelled, and that if a further guarantee of bonds is not forthcoming, he will be asked to resign on the ground that the government will not be able to carry out the railway, and particularly the cost of the necessary bridges.

It is known that other surveys have been made, including one to the west side of the St. John River below Gagetown, and that particulars of this survey will be demanded in order to show the difficulty of doing one to the east side of the river, and the cost of the necessary bridges.

Surprise is expressed here because St. John and other towns and cities—especially St. John—have not formally asked the government through a delegation, for reasonable information and specific guarantees as to the route and time of completion of the line from Fredericton to St. John.

A late report from Ottawa is to the effect that the dominion government will have nothing to do with the \$20,000,000 bridge across the St. John River.

On the other hand there is increasing feeling about the proposed bridge, and it is known that the C. P. R. supporters of the government realize that the bridge will be a great help to the downfall of the administration. Further developments will be awaited with keen interest.

IN THE LEGISLATURE

Fredericton, March 20.—The government at Fredericton is finding out that there are only two opposition members in a house of forty-four, they are of a very inquiring turn of mind.

They have asked many pertinent questions concerning the conduct of the province since the session began and will no doubt continue to endeavor to throw more light upon many transactions concerning which the people know little or nothing. Both Mr. Dugal and Mr. Pelletier understand but little English and speak the language of the house with much difficulty. In having the attention of the reports of the auditor general this year gives even less information than usual. Large sums are set opposite the names of "Various Persons" with information as to the service performed. This is not as it should be, and it is much to be regretted that lack of knowledge of the English language prevent Messrs. Dugal and Pelletier from showing the same industry probing the accounts as in making inquiries.

A real estate deal of some magnitude involving the Vassie and Barlow buildings in King street and smaller properties in Canterbury street is said to be under way presaging the establishment of a big wholesale and retail dry goods store here by a well known British firm.

The report is to the effect that a local man acting for the British group has already secured an option on the Vassie building at the corner of King and Canterbury streets and also on the Farrell building adjacent to Canterbury street now occupied by Vassie & Co.
