The steamer Arcturion has been heard from, under canvas with propeller damaged. She required no assistance.

Five lives were lost at the Portland fire. The colored stewardess of the Dido, and her little girl, the Assistant Engineer, Frank Taylor, a steward named Matteson, and an Irish girl named Nellie McCarthy, all of whom leaped from the Dido into the dock, and could not be rescued.

At 58 Vesey street, New York, to-day in the store of Steinhart Brothers & Schenck, Samuel Schenck was found dying from a pistol wound in the head. He had been shot by Ephraim Steinhart. After shooting Schenck he attempted suicide by shooting himself. Both men were mortally wounded.

ANOTHER WRECK ON THE NOVA SCOTIA COAST.

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 11.

Steamer Falmouth from Halifax has brought the crew of schooner Maryland from Port Chatham, C. B., for New Bedford, with coal, and the third of August on Mary Joseph Reef, 70 miles east of Halifax. Landing was made by the use of small boats. One of these was capsized for this purpose when the crew of the schooner came ashore with such force that a panic ensued. At once the passengers made a rush for the boat that was being lowered, crowding it full, when the landing broke and became unhitched and all were precipitated into the river. The terror-stricken passengers were forced by the waves to jump overboard when Capt. Wood and his crew threw life-preservers calling upon those struggling in the water to enter them and save themselves. The people on shore did all they could to assist in saving life but their means of rescue were very unequal to the terrible emergency.

GEN. GRANT AND COMPANY'S KIDNAPING.

Governor Austin and Mayor Brackett of Minneapolis have had interviews with Long Branch with the President regarding the Manitoba affair, and explained the whole matter from beginning to end, dwelling especially on the cruelty with which the prisoners are treated by the Manitoba authorities. They also sought to impress on the President the necessity for speedy action, as they feared that the people in Minnesota, unless immediate action was taken, would take the settlement of the case into their own hands. The President, according to dispatch, gave the Governor and Mayor to understand that unless the matter was disposed of within a reasonable time, demand in unmistakable terms would be made on the British Government, and would be followed by further action. The President then asked the Governor and Mayor to reduce their statements to writing, which they did, and the paper was forwarded to Secretary Fish, who will be visited to-day by his authority.

ATTENDED MURDER AND SUICIDE.

The Prerogative of Parliament—The Personnel of the Royal Commission to the Parliamentary Committee.

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.

It is morally certain that Parliament will be immediately prorogued in accordance with the promise given by the Premier at the adjournment.

The Royal Commission is appointed to take the evidence in the Pacific Railway scandal case will consist of two judges only, namely: Judge Gowan, senior Judge of the County Court, and Judge Day, Judge Gowan was appointed to office by Baldwin when he (Baldwin) was Attorney General and leader of the Reform party of Upper Canada, and Day is a retired Judge of high standing.
