Four Victory Bonds of \$50 each were subscribed for and purchased by organizations connected with Glencoe Presbyterian church for the benefit of the missionary budget. Two were got by the Sunday school, one by the Cradle Roll and one by the Young People's Guild.

The pollution of the atmospheric ocean by the odor from hundreds of thousands of decaying bodies of men and animals on the battlefields of Europe is responsible for the Spanish influenza epidemic, was the opinion of Dr. Watson in his address before the London Ministerial Alliance, Monday.

The quarterly official meeting of the officials of the Methodist church was held on Monday night. Some items of important business were dealt with. Owing to the greatly increased cost of living the pastor's salary was unanimously increased to \$1,200, which is the minimum salary fixed by the General Conference for ordained men.

A pretty wedding took place at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Baird, Parkhill, on Wednesday, November 13th, when their daughter, Jean Ferguson, was united in marriage to William Albert Sutherland of Parkhill. Miss Baird was formerly a teacher in the Glencoe high school. Mr. and Mrs. Sutherland have the best wishes of the community.

The annual meeting of the book club was held at the home of Mrs. Nell Graham on Monday afternoon and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. Nell Graham; vice-president, Mrs. Lucia Ham; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. C. O. Smith; librarian, Mrs. Grant; literary committee—Mrs. Wright, Mrs. McArthur, Mrs. J. Y. McLachlan and Miss Blackburn.

It is suggested that Glencoe get busy and see what can be done towards getting a trophy of the war for our public park or the grounds in connection with some of our public buildings. Glencoe and Foreign Bible Society, to the war but held her own in regard to patriotic giving, including the price of a machine gun. Several cases of Spanish influenza in a mild form developed in Newbury last week after it was thought the village was free of the epidemic. There are no new cases since Sunday and those affected are recovering.

The cause of the present epidemic promises to be as fruitful a subject of discussion as who was responsible for starting the war. It has been attributed to war diet, prohibition, German poison germs, and lack of sugar.
