The next sitting of the Ninth Division Court will be held here on the 19th of September.

The ladies of the Methodist Church are decorating the church in preparation for the harvest home festivities.

Mr. Jas. Hall is here renewing old acquaintances. We understand that he has decided to fit himself for the work of a missionary in China.

Mr. R. M. Percival's tailoring establishment in Delta, is maintaining its popularity. Mr. Percival's new advertisement will appear in our next issue.

Mr. Edgar M. Wrenn, of Eugene (City), Oregon, favored us with a call on Monday. He had been visiting friends at his former home, Elgin, and was then en route for the far West.

Unionville Fair, Sept. 14th, 15th, and 16th; Delta, Sept. 27th and 28th; Frankville, Sept. 29th and 30th; Lyndhurst, Sept. 29th and 30th; Newboro, Sept. 20th and 21st; Elgin, Sept. 3rd.

Mr. J. C. Stafford, of Lyndhurst, has purchased from Mr. John Day, for \$4,100, part of the old McCosrack farm, situated east of Gananoque on the corner of the Kidd road. We understand Mr. Stafford intends residing on his new property.

Farmersville High School reopened yesterday, and classes are being formed for teachers' certificates, university matriculation, arts, law and medicine. Candidates for any of these classes should present themselves as soon as possible, so as to miss none of the lectures.

The Frankville and Toledo Christian Band of Workers assembled on Sunday at the residence in Plum Hollow of Mr. Richard Bogart, and held divine service. Mr. Bogart, who is confined to the house by age and infirmities, was much pleased by the visit and the opportunity it afforded him of engaging in public worship.

There is talk of another boom in the affairs of the B. W. & S. Ste. Marie R. R. It is said that Contract or Hervey has effected a loan of sufficient magnitude to warrant the statement that the building of the line will now be pushed on energetically. Were this announcement made in connection with some other name, it would be easier to put faith in it.

The total rate to be collected in this municipality for 1887, inclusive of high school debenture and current expense rates and exclusive of public school rates, is 5-7/8 mills on the dollar, which will produce \$3,030. The rate last year for the same purposes was 3-7/8 mills on the dollar, resulting in the collection of \$4,967. The railway bonus rate will not be levied this year.

A correspondent of one of the Brockville papers takes pride in noting that Delta is the only place in the county where can be found a hotel at which liquor is not obtainable. We are informed on the very best authority that the proprietor of the Lyn House is another who may be placed in the same category, as he will not allow a drop of liquor on his premises, and is that particular that he will not even sell a cigar on a Sunday.

Mr. James Reid, of Lansdowne possesses a team of trained oxen, which he drives in harness, either single or double. The people of Delta are frequently treated to the sight of the smiling Jim driving to town in a buggy drawn by one of his unique steeds, which he handles with perfect ease, and which executes manoeuvres which would do no discredit to a good roadster horse.

While in Lyn yesterday we were shown through the butcher shop of E. D. Wilson, who has been long and favorably known to the people of Lyn and vicinity as a model caterer to the wants of his customers. The refrigerator is constantly supplied with nearly a ton of ice, which reduces the temperature to below 40 degrees. The supply is so arranged as to allow the meat to become thoroughly cooled before being offered to his customers. Mr. Wilson has the reputation of being one of the best buyers in the section around Lyn and can always readily buy the best in the market, which fact assures his customers a first class article.

Messrs. Lewis and Paterson have purchased the business formerly carried on by Messrs. Grigg & Barr, Brockville, and will open out in a few days with a new and complete stock of general dry goods. Mr. Lewis is known to Addison people as a thorough business man, and Mr. Paterson has had a number of year's experience with Messrs. Geo. C. Hutchinson & Co. We predict for them a successful career, and can confidently recommend the public to patronize them.

We visited Delta a day or two ago, and noted with pleasure an air of bustling activity among the business men of that rising village. We inspected the brick and tile manufactory of Mr. J. E. Brown, and were much interested by what we saw. Business is rushing in the yards, and Mr. Brown employs a total of fifteen hands. The quality of the manufactures turned out is excellent, and the sizes range from a small two inch pipe to a large conduit for constructing drainage mains. Over 100,000 tiles are now ready for delivery, in addition to a large stock of brick. Builders and farmers would consult their interests by communicating with Mr. Brown.

Attention is directed to the dates of the fairs, published elsewhere in this issue. Farmers, now is the time to commence preparations for making a good and large exhibit at the fairs. Stock raisers should not forget that the fair is the best place to advertise and sell any surplus stock. Mechanics, remember that if one of your carriages or implements takes a prize at a fair it is the very best kind of an advertisement you can have. Ladies, bear in mind that your department of the fair is especially attractive to the majority of fair-goers. We trust that every one who possibly can, will put forth an extra effort to make the fairs in this county a grand success.

On Wednesday of last week some Scott Act cases were tried here before Police Magistrate Judd, which created considerable interest. Inspector Phillips was the prosecutor, and conducted his cases in person. Mr. F. W. Campbell, of Gananoque, appeared for the several defendants, who were all charged with second offences. After the examination of nine witnesses, the case against Edward Duffield, of Charleston, was dismissed as not proven. The other two cases were against Fred. Pierce and Adam Armstrong respectively, and nearly fifty witnesses had been subpoenaed by the prosecution. The defence in both cases was that the refreshment bars had been leased—the one in the Armstrong House to Harry Johnston and the Gamble House bar to Joseph Stucky. Mr. Campbell asked for a dismissal of the cases upon this ground, but Inspector Phillips asked for an enlargement and a substitution of the names of Johnston and Stucky in the information. The Court decided to enlarge the case, and adjourned to the first of September. Subsequently Johnston and Stucky pleaded guilty, and each paid a fine of \$50 and costs. The cases of the first cases were adjudged against the prosecution.

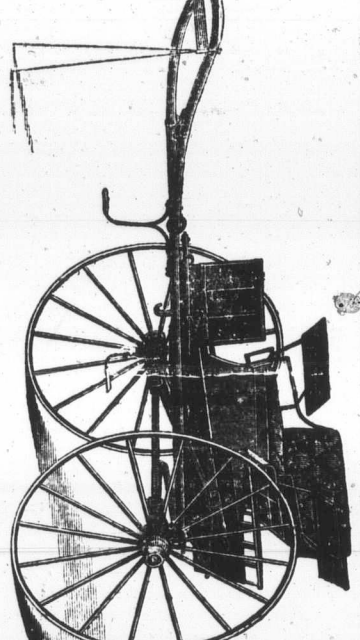
