Track and field to Dal Wed

The UNB Track and Field team will journey to Dalhousie University for the MIAA Championships Wednesday, Oct. 16. This year Coach Mal Early is confident that the team will return home bringing UNB its first track and field crown in many years.

Last year the squad did very well but were narrowly edged by the Dal "Tigers". A more balanced team with added depth should prove the key to the trackster's success this season. Although traditionally strong in the middle distance events, Mr. Early feels this

will be the weak point of the team; but he was also quick to add that this did not mean our milers are incapable of winning. Early pointed this out only to emphasize his confidence that this year's team is a winner.

Greatly aiding this year's team will be the addition of Saint John's Dave McAuley. McAuley is now eligible to compete after having sat out last season as a transfer student. He is expected to gain needed points in the jumps and hurdles. Another pleasant surprise has been the addition of freshmen sprinter Mike Vauteur. Vauteur,

winner of the 100 and 220 yd. dashes at the N.B.I.A.A. High School Championships, should garner points in the sprints where UNB failed to make an impression last year.

The field events should prove productive with the return of Bill Staples and Larry Wagner. Last year both boys accumulated points in the shot, discus and javelin and it is hoped they will improve on last year's performances. Dave McAuley and John Yaus in the triple and long jump are giving strong performances in training; and Edward Ogunboyo is considered a power in the high jump

and triple.

Turning to track events Mike Vauteur is showing strongly in the sprints. Brian McEwing consistently around 2:04 in the "half", looks like a potential winner, but positions in the mile are still up for grabs. The milers are currently involved in Cross Country but John McIsaac will likely get the nod.

All in all Coach Early is very optimistic. In spite of heavy academic loads, the boys are turning out regularly for practice and will be ready on Wednesday to return the Championship to UNB.

St. John squeezes by UNB for first win

A bitterly fought rugby game took place at Exhibition Raceway Sunday afternoon between the Saint John Trojans and the UNB Ironmen.

The Trojans opened the scoring in the first three minutes of the game with an unconverted try from Dick Hartley. Minutes later Saint John was forced to make a cross field kick in their own end. Fred McElmen of UNB took advantage of the situation scoring on a five yard run. Bob Kay converted, making the score 5 - 3 for UNB. At the thirty minute mark of the first half Phil Dow of the Trojans scored and

converted, putting Saint John into the lead. Kay playing his usual magnificent game opened the scoring for UNB in the second half on a brilliant forty yard run at the ten minute mark. Five minutes later Andy Angelopolous came back for Saint John to make the score 11 - 10 in their favour. At the twenty-five minute mark, Ron Briggs increased the Saint John lead on a passing play. Brian White successfully converted, making the score 16 - 10. Five minutes later UNB was awarded a penalty try which was successfully converted by Kay making the final score 16 - 15 for Saint John. The game was filled with the usual blood and gore

with Gary Briggs of UNB collecting a few stitches on his forehead which didn't however affect his excellent playing. Credit must also go to Kay as usual, as well as Fred McElmen and UNB Captain Peter Pacey, who were largely responsible for team spirit on the field. Stand out play for UNB was

however the exception rather than the rule, passing and tackling both leaving a lot to be desired. The Saint John team proved to be tough, determined competition and UNB is going to have to show marked improvement if they plan to beat Saint Thomas on Wednesday.
