They claim that they were told by the "Great White Chief" from Ottawa, a long time ago, that the game was theirs to kill for food at They say the "law does not grow old", meaning that that promise is as good to-day as when it was made. most of the Indians are amenable to our game laws, while others are not, and I suspect many infractions recently. While serving the summons for the enclosed case I had considerable trouble. It was only after riding all day through the Indian reservation that I found my man. The other Indians evidently knew my business and wilfully misinformed me as to his whereabouts. Fortunately, I met an Indian, Moses, an old friend; he told me where to find When I finally found him he was with several more Indians, a badly disgruntled bunch, full of threats. After giving the summons to Andrew Michel and explaining it to him, he threw it

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go alone.

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back at me and declared he would not obey it. I failed in my

attempts to talk any reason to them, and if it had not been for the

fact that they had no firearms, and that I had, I would have had

to sacrifice some dignity in getting safely off the reservation.
