# POSTAL INFORMATION.

Letters addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland, and United States, 3 cents per 1 oz or fraction thereof; city or drop letters for city delivery; 2c per 1 oz. or fraction thereof.

Letters to any place in Canada insufficiently prepaid will be forwarded and charged double the deficiency.

Letters posted wholly unpaid places within the Dominion or United States, and letters addressed to the United States not prepaid at least one full rate (3 cents) will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Re-directed letters are not liable to any additional postage if handed back to the post office with a changed address at the moment of delivery, or as soon as possible thereafter, provided always the change in the address does not require the letter to be sent ry place to which the postage rate is higher than was at first payable.

Letters, in places in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, sent in envelopes having printed or written thereon a request that the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered within a specified time will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated.

### Post Cards.

For Canada and the United States, 1 cent each. For Great Britain, New- days is not admissible. foundland, and all postal union countries, 2 cents each. Reply cards for Canada only, 2 cents each. One cent Canadian card will pass to Great Britain, etc., by prepayment of the extra cent stamp. Nothing must be attached to a post card.

## SECOND-CLASS MATTER.

Newspapers and periodicals posted from the office of publication, and authorized to pass free of postage to regular subscribers in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States.

Specimen papers are one cent per pound or fraction of a pound, to be prepaid by stamp or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General from time to time directs.

# THIRD-CLASS MATTER. Newspapers and Periodicals.

Transient newspapers within the Dominion and the United States, 1 cent per 4 oz., or fraction thereof-but a single paper weighing not more than 1 oz. will be forwarded for ½ cent. Lo-

than 1 oz., for city delivery, ½ cent each. For the United Kingdom and all European countries, the rate is 1 cent per 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz.

Foreign newspapers may be re-posted in Canada at the 1 cent per pound rate. Copies re-posted for local deliv-

ery, 1 cent per 4 oz.

The rate of postage upon all news-papers and periodicals posted in Canada, not otherwise provided for, and on books, pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices current, hand-bills, and other matter wholly in print; and on packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions, or grafts; patterns or samples of goods or merchandise, is 1 cent per 4 oz. or fraction thereof, to be prepaid by postage stamp or stamped postband or wrapper.

Upon all book and newspaper manuscript, printers' proof-sheets, whether corrected or not, maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs, photographs when not on glass or in cases containing glass, sheet music, whether printed or written documents, partly printed or written, not being letters or intending to serve the purpose of letters-such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of like nature, the rate of postage is 1 cent for each 2 oz., or fraction of 2 oz., to be prepaid by postage stamp or stamped postband or wrapper.

A Book Packet must be left open for inspection; it must not contain any enclosure, nor must it exceed 24 inches in length nor 12 inches in breadth or depth. The limit of weight of a book packet addressed to any place within the Dominion. Newfoundland or Great Britain, is 5 lbs. Postage to places in Canada, 1 cent per 4 oz.; to the United States, Great Britain and other European countries, 1 cent per 2 oz.

A Book Packet may contain a single invoice of the contents.

Commercial Papers and Legal Documents, including bank pass books, may be sent to Great Britain and the United States and all foreign countries at 5 cents for the first 10 ounces, and 1 cent for every additional 2 ounces.

### Circulars.

Are communications in print, or produced by a multiplying process easily distinguished from type writing, which are posted to several individuals, and cal newspapers weighing not more couched in identical terms. A circular
