The Last Days of Luther.

WHEN on the 17th inst., his native place, he

commenced twelve, ordaining two priests, and

ended it on the 24th. Thus, 7 days.

His death is preceded in the periodical which still exists, by his known from Martin, 25—27, and close of his days, "Thus," said his mother, may he rest in peace." The day before he died, he had a slight attack of fever, and was confined to bed. His friends, however, were encouraged, but the physician told them that it was no favourable symptom. A light was brought near his face, and it was evidently turning pale, and his face reddish, and feet were becoming cold. After some gentle breathings, and with folded hands, he quietly died, on Thursday the 18th of February, 1546, between two and three o'clock, in the morning, at the age of sixty-two years, three months, and eight days. —He was laid out upon a bed, with his head covered, and two painters were employed to paint his likeness.

—The Count of Mainz, who was accustomed

to visit him daily, said,

"I have seen him now,

and he is dead."

—He was buried in the church of the Cross, and the Crosses, Mass, with other mass, it seemed to me, were said for him. At the end of the service, the priest said, "We have buried the body of Martin Luther, the last of the great teachers of the church, and the last of the great reformers of the world, and the last of the great saints of the church." —*Ed. Stanp.*

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
