Good Sleighing. Sufficient snow fell since last Sunday morning to make fairly good sleighing, and the wheels have been put away for the meantime. It was predicted by many that a spell of mild weather would follow the thunder storm of Saturday night, but it has turned out the other way this time.

Deceased was a fine, Christian woman, and much beloved and esteemed by all her acquaintances. She leaves to mourn her decease a husband, one daughter and one son, to whom is extended the sympathy of the whole community.

## Son Passes Away.

After an illness extending over several months, Anthony, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Waechter of the Elora road, Carrick, passed away on Tuesday evening of this week. Anthony, was employed at Rudolph Siegner's this summer and some time in July he complained about a sore shoulder blade. He consulted a doctor, who was unable to pronounce upon the trouble at that time.

A few weeks later the trouble developed into a cancer, and although an operation was performed for its removal, very little hopes was held out for his recovery. He was brought home and his condition kept growing worse until death came to his release on the above date. Deceased was about nineteen years old, and was a fine, quiet industrious young man. He was a member of the Mildmay band for a time, and was a clever musician.

The funeral takes place on Friday morning at the Mildmay R. C. cemetery, leaving the residence at 8 o'clock. The sorrowing family have the heartfelt sympathy of all their friends in their sad loss.

Walkerton Dam Partly Wiped Away. The heavy rains of last week has caused damage to the new dam of the Walkerton Electric Light Company that hundreds and perhaps thousands of dollars will be required to make good the breach made by the water. The dam had been practically completed when the freshet began, and the 18-foot gap seemed incapable of bearing the heavy waters of the Saugeen when the bank on the south end of the dam gave way and allowed the waters to go around the end of the dam, tearing out from 20 to 40 feet of the embankment. On this bank stood a threshing engine and boiler for pumping out the water from behind the coffer dam and a cement mixer which the workmen found later in the river some distance below the dam. The threshing boiler has been recovered from the waters, but the engine and cement mixer are still at the bottom of the river. To fill this gap 30 feet or extend the cement dam to the new bank will cause serious delay at the approach of winter, besides the added expense and the length of time the company will suffer as a result of the new dam being used by the town will mean thousands of dollars to the company. Many citizens were out to see the result of the flood and how the breach is to be repaired is yet a conundrum to the company, of which the principal shareholders are John Rowland and David Robertson; K. C.
