CATHERINE GING'S MURDER

Hayward Must Pay the Pen-

alty for His Crime

St. Pāul, Minn., Dec. 7.—Gov. Clough has signed the warrant ordering the execution of Harry T. Hayward between the hours of midnight and daylight on Wednesday, December II. On the night of December 3. 1894. Claus A. Blixt killed Catherine Ging, a pretty dressmaker of Minneapolis, on Excelsior road, a few miles from the city. A day or two later it developed that Blixt had killed the girl for \$2,000 promised him by Hayward, who desired to secure \$10,000 insurance on Miss Ging's life, which had been assigned to him. Six days after the awful tragedy Blixt made a full confession, implicating Hayward. Adry Hayward, Harry's brother, also confessed that Harry had tried to hire him to kill the girl. There was a heartrending scene at the Governor's office shortly before 10 o'clock this morning when the father and mother of the condemned man appeared and made a tearful appeal for the life of their son. Arrangements are being prafected for the shipment of live stock from St. John, N. Bt., for the steamship service recently arranged for. Mr. W. Atonzo Cheeley has been temporarily appointed inspector of cattle-pens and littings. The service will be inaugurated by the Lake Superior. Already a large number of applications have been made for sheep space. The owners have applied for permission to use deckroom for sheep, and this has been accorded. It seems pretty certain that the venture will be a success.

In the Act of Parliament by which the Experimental farms were established, it was wisely provided that one of the objects to be carried outant these institutions was the testing of "the merits hardiness, and adaptability of new or untried varieties of plants and trees." For the carrying out of this provision there was set a idea, the outset, at the Con rai farm, 45 acces of land, to be especially devoted to the purpose of an arbocotum and botanic garden.

During the long period which had elpased since the endowment and establishment of the Arnold arboretum there has been brought together there, by the visits of the learned director to foreign countries, exchanges with other institutions, and the assistance of botanists, a very large collection. This collection is especially rich in rare species and varieties from Northern Japan and China, countries which Professor Sargent has twice visited. By request of Prof. Sargent, the foreman of forestry at the Central farm Mr. W. T. Macoun, who has charge of the collection here, visited the Arnold arboretum, and assisted in making a selection for Ottawa. These were duly forwarded, and have been safely recolved. This collection included 179 species and varieties of trees and shrübs, and cuttings of 24 species of willow, nearly all of which are new to the collection here. A package has also been received recently from Siberia from Professor Max Sivers, of Romershof, containing six species of trees and shrubs from that so out.
