NO SHADES ALLOWED

License Inspector R. B. Phillips says the following regulation recently passed by the board of license commissioners for Brockville and Leeds, is to be rigidly enforced:—

There shall be no screen, blind, unnecessary partition or other obstruction erected or allowed to remain erected upon any licensed premises wherein liquor is sold, from being open to view from the nearest public street, and no curtain or curtains shall be placed, or if now so placed, allowed to remain upon the windows of said bar-room or other said portion of the said licensed premises, or other material or thing which does or would prevent the observation of a light in said bar-room or said other portion of said licensed premises being readily distinguished after dark from the nearest public street; and any person who shall erect or allow to remain erected any such obstruction or curtain, and infringe upon said regulation, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$10 and not exceeding \$50 for every day during which such obstruction or curtain shall remain erected or placed.
