In addition to farm work, Mr. Lee has fenced forty acres of land the poles for which (85 loads) were hauled 8 miles. He has up a two story house, 18x26 feet, has built 50 foot horse barn, also a root-house or milk room 6x18 feet, and dug two wells that have not failed during the


