COMMONS CHEER U. S. ADMIRAL.

Foreign Secretary Grey Pays Tribute
to Davis for Jamaica Incident.

London, March 15.—The incident
involving Governor Sweetenham of Ja-
maica and Rear-Admiral Davis, U. S.
N., at the time of the Kingston earth-
quake, was brought up in the House
of Commons yesterday in a hypothet-
ical question by Jesse Collings, Lib-
eral-Unionist, member for the Berdes-
ley division of Birmingham, who was
in Kingston at the time of the dis-
aster.

The question brought out from For-
eign Secretary Grey a hearty tribute
to the American admiral.

Mr. Collings asked if it was in ac-
cordance with international law and
international etiquette for an admiral
of a foreign country to land an arm-
ed force in a British colony without
the permission of the governor. The
Foreign Secretary, in reply, said:
"No, and I may add that no such
rights were claimed in the incident
referred to. What I am convinced of
is that while, in the presence of such
a catastrophe, there was a certain
amount of misunderstanding, the Amer-
ican admiral was inspired by single-
minded motives and a desire to re-
lieve suffering. Any other construction
placed on his action is most unworthy
and untrue."

Mr. Collings then asked if the fact
did not demand that in opposition to
the governor, armed troops were land-
ed when there was no cause or war-
rant for such action, but the Foreign
Secretary said:

"According to my information, the
questionnaire conveys a statement, which
is not borne out by facts."
The Foreign Secretary's tribute to
Rear-Admiral Davis was heartily
approved.

POINT SCORED
BY DELMASAbe Hummel Not Allowed
To Produce Mrs. Thaw's
Affidavit

EVELYN LIED TO THAW

New York, March 15.—When the
Thaw trial opened yesterday morning
Abraham Hummel was recalled to the
stand.

Delphin M. Delmas immediately be-
gan his argument in reply to District
Attorney Jerome as to the admissibil-
ity of the evidence Hummel has to
offer regarding an affidavit Evelyn
Nesbit is said to have made. In this
affidavit, the district attorney stated
Wednesday, Miss Nesbit asserted that
Thaw had beaten her when she re-
fused to sign papers charging White
with her ruin, and swore that the
charge against White was not true.
In his argument Mr. Delmas said:
"We still contend that this witness
was acting as attorney to this girl.
It is not for him, by his word, to deny
that such a relation existed. However,
we will reserve that objection."

Appeals to Jury.
Mr. Delmas then turned to the ad-
missibility of evidence contradicting
the statements of a witness made out
of court. He said he had not objected
to Mr. Jerome's address Wednesday,
as he trusted "to the fair-mindedness
of the jury, which is my only protec-
tion."

Mr. Delmas finally asked that the
court rule out Hummel's testimony as
improper and having no bearing on
the case.

The judge upheld the contention of
Mr. Delmas.

A Long Question.
After repeating to Dr. Flint the same
question which Mr. Delmas put to
the experts for the defence and hav-
ing him say that Thaw was sane, on
the basis of the facts therein, District
Attorney Jerome had read to the wit-
ness the prosecution's hypothetical
question, which contains some 15,000
words and which required one hour
and eighteen minutes in the reading.
Dr. Flint again said, without qualifi-
cations, that Thaw knew his act was
wrong and is therefore liable for mur-
der in the first degree under the sta-
tutes of the State of New York.

Jerome's statement that the taking
of evidence would be concluded by
to-night has been abandoned, and
those concerned in the case again look
to April 1 as the earliest date for
closing the long drawn out trial.

Damaging Assertion.

Abraham Hummel was on the stand
yesterday. Before Delmas could
object to a question put to him by
Jerome, the witness got into the re-
cord the statement that Evelyn Nes-
bit told him that she had seen Harry
Thaw in Paris in 1903 that Stanford
White positively did not
know her.

Delmas at first moved to have the
question and answer stricken out from
the record, but, when the district at-
torney seemed about to consent, the
chief counsel for the defence insisted
that the answer stand.

Hummel's further testimony was
halted until Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw
can again take the stand to testify
as to whether or not Hummel was
acting as her attorney when she made
the statements to him which were af-
terwards embodied in the affidavit.

Both Jerome and Delmas were ir-
ritable yesterday and had frequent
clashes. The strain of the trial is
palpably telling on everyone connect-
ed with it.

It was reported last night that Je-
rome himself may be called to the
witness stand in rebuttal by the
defence. The purpose, it is said, is to
question him as to certain actions ly-
ing against Abraham Hummel, who
was a witness yesterday.

Throng at Dowie's Funeral.
Chicago, March 15.—John Alexander
Dowie was buried yesterday in Lake-
meadow Cemetery, Zion City.

A small portion of the magnificent
choir that formerly officiated in Zion
City Tabernacle sang several hymns.
The body of Dowie was arrayed in
the white robe he had worn since he
assumed the title of "first apostle of
the Christian Catholic Church."

The funeral cortege was attended
by hundreds of members of the church
and, when the body was lying in
state, a constant stream of visitors
called.

Scores sought to be cured of dis-
ease by touching the hem of Dowie's
robe.

Britain Being Robbed.
London, March 15.—(C. A. P.)—The
Illustrated London News says that
Canada's excellent land and enter-
prising advertisements will doubtless
lead still further to diminish Great
Britain's agricultural population,
and after a time leave nothing at
home but the very young, very old,
or very stupid and unenterprising
sections of the rural dwellers.

Novelist Praises Canada.
London, March 15.—(C. A. P.)—
Three hundred Salvation Army emi-
grants left Euston Station for Canada
yesterday. Rider Haggard addressed
them on their departure, and said, as
any rate, they were going to a land
where every man could rise who put
his back into the work.

Hanged in Cell by a Towel.
Plattsburg, N. Y., March 15.—Mi-
chael Yesdow, serving a life sentence
at Clinton Prison for murder, who
recently killed a fellow convict, hanged
himself with a towel Wednesday
night rather than undergo trial for
his last crime.

Bigamist Gets Two Years.
Montreal, March 15.—Swartward,
the New Haven, Conn., man, who
married the dining-room cashier of
the Queen's Hotel, while having a
wife and five children in New Haven,
was sentenced to two years imprison-
ment yesterday.

Was Case of Suicide.

Toronto, March 15.—Coroner Cot-
ton's jury returned a verdict yester-
day afternoon that Margaret Wilson,
the young girl found dying under the
Huntley street bridge Wednesday

oning by carbolic acid bought and
administered by herself.

An interesting feature of the case
was the sending of the stomach of the
deceased to the university to be photo-
graphed for the British museum.

"The case," said Dr. Johnson, who
made the postmortem, "was a most
peculiar one. This girl apparently had
nothing to eat for at least ten hours.
The acid she took—fifteen teaspoon-
fuls—absolutely burned the walls of
the stomach, nothing but a white
paste remaining."
