## A DASTARDLY DEED.

The attempt to blow to pieces the King and Queen of Spain on their wedding day, converting the fête of a loyal people into a saturnalia of death and horror, traces out an impulse which the normal, healthy mind of man, whatever his race or his speech, simply cannot grasp. Of a more dastardly, brutal, cowardly thing history has no record. The escape of the King and his terrified bride was miraculous, providential. The deflection of the bomb from their carriage by an electric wire alone saved them. The slaughter of sixteen innocent persons and the maiming of a score or more mark another sacrifice to the fury of those blood-mad slayers against whom no Government finds it possible infallibly to protect its executive head.

In a recent editorial the Hamilton Spectator says that the murderous attack, coming as it did upon their wedding day, shows the utter unreason of the conspirators who sought their lives. One may understand the murder of an old monarchial tyrant who has oppressed his people beyond the limit of endurance; but in the case of Alfonso and Victoria there was absolutely no excuse for the attempt made upon their lives. The young king never did anybody any harm. He is exceedingly popular with his people—a manly, pleasant boy, with ill will toward none. The Queen is of the blood of good Queen Victoria—and no praise can be higher than that statement.

The attempted murder will make the King and Queen intensely popular with all classes of the Spanish people, and will probably enable the young King to pull his kingdom together and create harmony where there has been friction; the success of the plot would have been followed by a most rigorous crusade against the king-killer in every country in the world, including Britain, which has been exceedingly lenient in its treatment of these scoundrels. Therefore the plot was ill-advised.

It is to be hoped that the conspiring murderers will be sought out and punished for the terrible loss of life for which they are responsible. Murder must not be recognized as a legitimate agent for the reform of Governments.

## A BUSINESS POLICY.

The first fruits of the Ontario Government's policy of demanding public tenders for pulpwood areas is announced in the acceptance by the Government of a tender by J. A. Booth, Ottawa, for what is known as the Montreal River area.

By the conditions laid down, Mr. Booth must pay dues of 40c. per cord on all spruce cut, and 20c. per cord on all other wood. The stipulation as to spruce is unchanged from that of the late Government, but up to the present only 10c. per cord has been the charge on the other wood. Mr. Booth must manufacture 20,000 cords per annum, which he may do in his Ottawa mill, and he has agreed to pay the Government, in addition a bonus of \$300,000 for the privilege.

The Premier stated that the new policy has resulted in the receiving of offers for several areas, including the one from Mr. Booth.

"As is well known, he remarked, the late Government disposed of a number of valuable pulpwood areas to individuals and syndicates by secret bargains, the terms of which, it is strongly suspected, did not appear in the written contracts."

A number of these agreements having lapsed since the new Government came into power, among them the Montreal River area, which the Premier states, is the largest and most valuable, tenders have been invited, and the results so far justify confident expectations in Mr. Whitney's opinion of substantial revenues.

In referring to the Provincial Government's education bill, at the recent meeting of the South York Teachers' Association, President Hartman Jones expressed the opinion that the advisory council would remove the control of education from politics and that the public school teachers were treated fairly in regard

to their representation on the council. The fixing of a reasonable minimum for salaries of teachers was satisfactory, and the standard of the teaching profession would be raised by the abolition of third-class certificates. It would be beneficial to close all the Model schools, and to establish more Normal schools, where better training might be secured. "Give the senate work," says the cruel London Advertiser, evidently believing that everybody should work, not evening excepting grandpa.—Ottawa Citizen
