Ontario Phones for a Dollar a Year.

The successful workings of the Municipal Telephone Act as carried out by the Township of Rochester, County of Essex, is the subject of an interesting pamphlet just issued by the hydro electric commission. Numerous enquiries have been made from time to time as to how this act, enabling municipalities to install a telephone system of their own, was working and the commission decided to give out all information possible for their municipality as well as to provide the best service at the least possible cost.

The pamphlet shows that after two years of successful operation, 385 subscribers paid off one-fifth of the laborator indebtedness, and in seven years more they hope to own the system free from debt. The present annual revenue is taking care of the fixed charges and cost of operating has given the prospect that in seven years more, an annual charge of \$1 will maintain the system. In other words, the present subscribers will have practically free telephones at the end of the tenth year. The success and efficiency which has been obtained by that municipality has attracted wide attention and has established the fact that the rural telephone is not only contributing its share in making country life more pleasant, but it has proved of great value as a commercial undertaking.

There are now fifteen municipal telephone systems in operation, the largest being that of Ingersoll, with 600 telephones, and Rochester has now 223 subscribers. The institution of such a system as there was attended with some difficulties, many of which have been removed by legislation enacted at a recent session of the Legislature. The Municipal Telephone Act was introduced in 1907 by the Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the hydro electric power commission.—Toronto World.

Fruit Conference.

The third Dominion Conference of Fruit Growers was held at Ottawa, with a large attendance. It is reported that there was not the desirable unanimity among the members, especially in regard to a standard for the size of the apple barrel.
Two standards for the apple barrel were adopted by the conference, one in Nova Scotia, and the other the 117 quart size common in Ontario, and most other parts of the country.
Among the most important resolutions passed were the following:
That a board of fruit growers in each province be formed as a committee to advise in the appointment of inspectors; that \$20,000 be voted by the Government as a grant to the next national apple show, in Montreal, provided that the promoters of that show are willing to offer \$20,000; that the Government be requested to raise the tariff on peaches; that an apple box with a capacity of 200 cubic inches be made the legal standard throughout Canada, to come into effect within two years; that the question of most suitable shapes for fruit packages be left over to the next conference, with the understanding that in the meantime investigation shall be made preferably by the Government; that certificates be given by fruit inspectors on the payment of a reasonable fee; that the Government be urged to inspect as much as possible at the point of shipment and that the Government have daily market prices cabled from agents in Europe during the shipping season and published in the daily papers throughout Canada.

Hereafter the people of the Magdalen Islands are not to be kept in ignorance of what goes on in the rest of the Dominion. It was announced by Hon. L. P. Pelletier, Postmaster General, in Ottawa that a weekly service by Marconi wireless would be established between Pictou, N. S., and the Islands. The service would be limited to one thousand words a week to be read in the churches, etc. The annual cost will be \$450.
Juarez, Mexico, claims to be the only city in the world in which the direction and control of the city parks have been turned over completely to a board of eight women managers having exclusive control over them.

A New Departure.

The British government is contemplating an innovation in the form of junior ministers. The British system of government provides for under secretaries in the several departments. It has been pointed out that in a growing country like Canada that a multitude of duties which devolve on the Ministers of the Crown who preside over some of the heavier departments make it an almost physical impossibility for them to give that attention to details which a proper conduct of affairs requires. The whole question has been the subject of discussion and we select a few opinions. One writer reminds his readers that the matter of naming junior ministers was often discussed, as the duties connected with the various departments are constantly becoming greater, and it was felt that something must be done to relieve the situation. Since the accession of the Conservatives to office some of the more hard-pressed Ministers have found it almost impossible to deal with the amount of work with advantage to the country. It was at first thought by the Government that perhaps the congestion of work could be dealt with by a more even distribution of the work among the Ministers who were not so heavily taxed, but it developed that this would lead to so much confusion that the idea was abandoned. The Government then turned its attention to an investigation of the British system, and it is believed that they are satisfied that it would work well in Canadian practice.
