Port Elgin Station.

The Station House, at Port Elgin,
on the N. B. & P. E. Ry., was located
by the Company's engineer on the
east side of the river. A number of
the business men there memorialized
the company, and afterwards the
Government, against the location
and in favor of one on the west side
of the river, and pending the de-
cision over these efforts, the Com-
pany has delayed the erection of
sidings, &c. Last Wednesday,
Mr. Maxwell, C. E., Government
Engineer, visited the locality for
the purpose of reporting, after per-
sonal inspection, the merits of the
respective sites to the Local Gov-
ernment for its decision—the de-
termination of the site resting ulti-
mately with the Government. Mr.
Maxwell has made no report as yet,
but it is understood that he endorses
the decision of the company's
engineer, so far as rejecting any
location immediately near the bridge
on the west side, and it rests with
the Government to decide between the
summit level west of the Port
Moncton Road and the site pre-
viously selected—both being about
the same distance from the business
centre of Port Elgin. The Port
trusts that a decision satisfactory to
the interests of Port Elgin, as well
as the Company, will be arrived at
quickly, in order that station build-
ings may be erected as speedily as
possible.

Cape Tormentine.

—A Mr. Belyea from Kings Co.,
contemplates erecting a large supply
store here.—John A. Wheaton will have the
grading on the Cape Railway com-
pleted in a few days, right up to the
jumping off place.—The contractors for the big
pier are here, enjoying the scenery
and the pleasant sunshine in the
shade of Job D. Allen's, and keeping
themselves busy by whitening.

From Memorandum.

—The College at St. Joseph is
again deserted.—Mr. Maxwell, C. E., visited
here on Thursday to examine the
bridge, which threatens to fall into
the river.—McManus & Sons, besides
being one of the largest trading
firms in the country, is also one of
the largest farming concerns. They
raise about 300 tons of hay. Last
year they raised on 17 acres, 1,099
bushels of oats from 51 bushels
seed. This year they have sowed
88 bushels. They use improved
machinery and are believers in the
efficacy of manure.

Brooklyn.

Railway.—Mr. Sanford Hicks has built a
fine dwelling house which greatly
improves the appearance of things

said to run a boarding house.—The potato bug has put in an
appearance and is making great
havoc among the potato plants
which are just coming up. As
yet the bugs have been found on
one plant.—As Mr. Leonard Richardson
and his wife were returning from
Jolicure on Tuesday night their
horse took fright while crossing
the Long Lake bridge and ran away
with the carriage. Mr. Richardson
was thrown into the lake and had a narrow escape
from drowning.—Quite a sensation has been
created in this section by the elopement
on the night of the 21st ult. of
Mrs. Richardson, who was taken
by the wife of Mr. James Townsend. Oulton
was the only professional horse
doctor in the vicinity, and conse-
quently will be missed to some ex-
tent.

Wood Point.

—There are fourteen boats engaged
in the shad fishery at present but
no good fares have yet been reported.—The "merry war" between
Messrs. Ward and Tower still con-
tinues, and the Sackville courts re-
spond to the challenge. The odds up to date
appear to be against Ward.—Messrs. Roberts Bros. have
again secured possession of Mary's
Point quarries, and men are now at
work fitting up, preparatory to
pushing operations vigorously during
the remainder of the season.—A warrant has been issued
against two young men of this
place for breaking windows last week
in the house of Mr. John Atkinson,
of Westcott.—It is reported that the
young men are anxious to effect a
settlement, but it is probable that
the matter will be carried to the
County Court.—A barque, supposed to be a Nor-
wegian, has been lying in the stream
since Saturday. Mr. Helton has
been neaped for the last fortnight.
Her captain has been ill but is re-
covering. Simon Outhouse has al-
ready sold three cargoes of piling at
fair prices. He is expecting the
arrival of other vessels to load.

River Hebert.

—The Refreshment Booth adver-
tised for Shulee on the day of the
launch of the Big Raft is declared off.
The Refreshment Booth has been

Drill Shed.—Mr. Ben Baird is erecting a

locality. The line nearly follows
the old line.—Dr. McQueen has sold his

of Amherst Shore. The latter is
erecting an office for himself. The
former contemplates a course of
medical study in London, for which
he leaves early in July.—Two Amherst parties have
lately been running the Lawrence
mine and have got out a lot of coal.
One of them, Abner Ripley,
"skipped" out a few days ago,
being the satiated displeasure and
regret of his creditors. Cumber-
land being too narrow an arena for
the exercise of his talents, he is, no
doubt in the land of the free. Nova

having failed.—Fifty-one persons in all were killed
in the late election riots in Chili, and
the hospitals are filled with wounded.

Rev. D. D. Currie's Case.

In May 1885, a committee of investiga-
tion was appointed to look into certain
charges which had been preferred by Rev.
C. W. Hamilton against Rev. D. D.
Currie. The committee met at Scot-
tish, Queen Co., and proceeded to an
investigation, which resulted in a
report in which it was stated that
Mr. Currie being suspended until the
meeting of the N. B. & P. E. I. Con-
ference in June of the same year. In
accordance with the Methodist discipline,
the committee reported to the N. B. & P. E.
Conference, and the result was a vote
of eight to four decided
against Mr. Currie, but the appeal court
set aside their finding and ordered a new
trial on the ground that new evidence
had come to light for the defence—Mr.
Currie in the meantime remaining sus-
pended. Last autumn a new committee
of investigation looked into the matter at
Scottish. This time Mr. Currie had
been regularly served with notice and ap-
peared before the committee, to meet
another adverse decision. He was
further suspended until the late meeting
of Conference at Sackville—when a new
trial court and court of appeal were ap-
pointed. The trial court acquitted him
on the first charge—viz. seduction—and
was evenly divided on the second—viz.
charge—that of adultery. The president
of the Conference having held that the
trial was defective, so far as the second
charge was concerned, appointed a new
trial to determine this charge. Mr.
Currie, it seems, was of the opinion that
he had not had fair play from the com-
mittee. He had had no notice of the
sitting of the trial investigating committee,
which suspended him without the
courts at Charlottetown had been made
up largely of those who had prejudged
him. The second investigating com-
mittee had six out of nine members who
had already decided judicially that he
was guilty. The president had nominated
as members of the trial court at Sackville
almost every man who had sat on the
previous investigations and trials and had
decided adversely to Mr. Currie, and it
was only by the refusal of Conference to
accept the nominations that he could get
a fair trial. The president of the trial
court, at Sackville—the fair trial—of
which was entirely in the hands of the
president—consisted of nine members,
of whom five or six had once or twice sat
on previous committees or courts, and one
and actually been a witness before the
trial court at Charlottetown. Mr. Currie,
claiming to be mentally incapacitated
by worry and weariness of sleep to
conduct his defence, was refused the
privilege of having Rev. Dr. Sprague act
as counsel for him. He was, however,
evidence against him consisted of minutes
made by a brother minister of what the
girl—his alleged victim—had stated
that under oath before the
investigating committee, at Scot-
tish, while there was refused, as evi-
dence the minutes made by Mr. Currie's
counsel of what he had said on oath at the
civil trial at Gagetown. Mr. Currie having
nominated a legal gentleman here, was
advised that, in the light of these facts,
the prospect of obtaining British justice
was very dim, and that he had better
get an order from the Supreme court
prohibiting the Conference courts from
going further in the matter. Rev. Dr.
Williams had laid down the law that the
procedure in the conference courts was in
no way controlled by the principles of
civil procedure and that the courts them-
selves were absolutely free from all con-
trol on the parts of the civil courts. Mr.
Currie's advice, however, was to effect
that the Act of Parliament of 1884,
incorporating the Methodist Church, by
which the Conference was constituted
into the statute, had placed the church
courts under the corrective jurisdiction of
the superior civil courts, and that Dr.
Williams' law was no longer applicable to
the Methodist Church. The time,
however, was too limited to obtain
the order of prohibition, but a door
of escape was opened by the trial
court afterwards adjourning for three
days to obtain the aid of a witness.
Mr. Currie then made his way
speedily to the "celestial city" calling
on his way and taking Mr. Leonard Currie
with him. Friday morning the trial court
convened pursuant to adjournment. The
prosecutor had returned with three wit-
nesses from Grand Lake, and was present
in court, when smilingly up the street
came Mr. Currie and his attorney, and
politely handed each in turn a copy of
an order made by a full bench of the Supreme
Court, commanding each and all to pre-
cede no further. The Conference imme-
diately gathered, and Dr. Pickard broke
the silence by raising a question of
privilege. He thought it was an unwar-
ranted assumption of power on the part
of the civil authorities, an unjustifiable
interference with religious liberty, and that
no question of dollars and cents should
prevent them from fighting the matter to
the bitter end. Mr. Read thought it
was most monstrous for the court to inter-
fere with the cause of God as it had.
By setting the General Superintendent at
this making him party to the cause the
court had shown a blow at liberty of con-
science in the fact of its taking the side
of the Dominion, in the whole Do-
minion of Canada from Nova Scotia and
the Atlantic to British Columbia and
the Pacific, and the far off empire of Japan.
He advocated the ignoring of the order
and letting the Supreme Court put them
down. The conference was loudly applauded.
One reverend gentleman said "I wonder out-
board 'Wanderer' Sunday. When in
God do the things that are God's. This is
a matter of God and of conscience."
The conference then adjourned. Dr. Wil-
liams adhered to his former statement of
what was law. "If it were me," said he,
"I know what I'd do. I know what I'd
do. I'd go to Dorchester; I'd go to Dor-
chester. Rev. Mr. Evans took a more
philosophic view of the situation and
thought that, as ministers, they were bound
to obey the order of the court, which so
far as the Supreme Court was concerned,
was taken as a matter of course. The
conference then adjourned. The court
might be wrong, however, or the order
might be granted, and the responsibility
of disobeying the order of the court
to get the order set aside if possible. Rev.
Mr. Dobson was unwilling to take the
responsibility of disobeying the order of the
court. Rev. Mr. Paisley was willing to
accept Dr. Williams' view of the law as
against the Supreme Court, provided the
Doctor indemnified him against all costs,
penalties and imprisonment. One mem-
ber of the conference had no objection to
going to Dorchester if it would do the
church any good, but as it was a doubtful
case he would prefer to get home to his
gardening. Gradually the milder con-
science prevailed and the conference decided
to stand adjourned and await the further
action of the Supreme Court. The mem-
bers then quickly dispersed, and the
prosecutor and his witnesses, who had so
stately marched up the hill now marched
down again.
