A New Freight Steamer's Novel Devices for big Loads and Little Fuel. The British SS. "Davenport," which arrived at New York July 21 from Hamburg, is the second of the new kind of freight steamer having great storage capacity. She is built of Siaman Martin steel, with patent roller bottom and a peculiar arrangement of the frames that gives an unusually roomy hold. The cabin is under the bridge. It is a round iron turret. Its advantage is that it gives no hold to a heavy sea, which may wash over the ship. The "Davenport" has new and important improvements in marine engines. Hillsboro ocean steamers have been obliged to use more or less sea water in their boilers. In the "Davenport" the salt water is pumped into an evaporator supplied with steam from the intermediate jacket of the boiler. By a patented appliance it is rapidly distilled, in the evaporator and sent into the boiler absolutely pure water and at a temperature of 170 degrees. Minute records of the performance of the machine show an average consumption of coal of twelve and one-half tons in twenty-four hours, an indicated horse power of 950 and an average speed of nine knots.—N. Y. Maritime Register.

Levelling Sacrifices in West Africa. By latest advices from the West Coast of Africa, it is learned that a most revolting sacrifice has just taken place in the interior. A few months ago the old King of Eboe died, and as is customary, traders from New Calabar went up to pay their respects to the new monarch. On their arrival the traders found the "Ja Ja" rites, performed on the death of the native king, still in progress, and about forty victims had been sacrificed. The old king was still lying in an open grave, large enough to accommodate nine of the departed ruler's youngest wives, who had been murdered in the most cruel manner. Each of them had her ankles and wrists broken, so that she could neither walk nor crawl. In this maimed condition, and suffering most excruciating pain, the poor creatures were placed at the bottom of the grave, and the king's body was laid on top of them. The king's body was laid by his side. They were left without food or water, to wait for death, which, however, it was said, did not come until after four or five days of intense suffering. In the meantime four men were stationed around the grave, armed with clubs, ready to knock backward any of the women who, despite their tortures and their pain, might manage to crawl to the side of the pit. In other parts of the town other human sacrifices had been performed, and the bodies of various trees were the bodies of several men. They, too, were undergoing agonizing deaths, holes having in most cases been bored through their feet near the ankles. Through these holes ropes were drawn and the men were tied to a high tree, head downward, and left to die.

Important Discovery. Late press despatches state that a firm in Chicago engaged in the manufacture of tin cans and japanned ware, has patented an invention which competent judges say is revolutionary in the tin and steel industry of the world. Patents have been secured in the leading countries of the world. It is a process by which molten metal may be rolled into any desired shape, thus saving all intermediate processes. It was invented originally to roll molten solder in thin plates, but the process is pronounced by experts to be equally applicable to iron and steel in its various forms of plates, structural iron and rails. It is believed the cost of manufacturing steel rails can be reduced to the extent of \$10 per ton, and that thin iron plates for tinning can be made much below the cost of production of tin plates in Wales, thus making a new industry in this country. The molten metal is passed between rollers which are chilled as it passes, the rollers being cooled by a stream of water which passes through them. The rollers are so arranged that the metal is rolled so close to the texture that that subjected to present processes.

A Boy's Fearful Crime. MASON CRTT, La. July 27.—On Wednesday night last, in the town of Clayton county, Wesley Elkins, but little more than seven years of age, killed his father and step mother. After committing the crime he took his infant sister in a carriage and drove four miles to the nearest neighbor, reporting that he discovered his parents murdered and had fled to preserve his own and his sister's life. Yesterday he confessed himself the murderer.

Youngful Criminals. A shocking story of infantile depravity comes from Spartanburg county, S. C. Gabriella Steadman, a little girl three years of age, was left home by her father to be nursed by her sister Hester, eight years old. A brother, eleven years old, was in a field near the house. Friday morning a woman passing the Steadman place heard the three year old child crying and asked Hester why she did not try to quiet it. The eight year old girl replied that "she would give her something that would settle her" if she did not quit crying. Two hours later Hester and her brother went to a neighbor's house and told the people that their little sister was dead. These persons went to Steadman's and found the little child carefully covered up in a bed quite dead, with a wound on the back of her head. A stick was found on the floor with which the murder was committed. It is not known whether the girl Hester killed her sister unaided or whether she was assisted by her brother. As yet nothing has been done to either of them.
