And the mistake most of the women make is to confuse it in its meaning with the word "markdown."

Now, a bargain is not necessarily a markdown, and even more frequently a markdown is not necessarily a bargain.

What a lot more value some women could get out of their money if they could only grasp those facts as a working proposition.

While I was waiting for my fitting at the dressmaker's the other day a young friend of mine came in with some goods which she said she wanted made into a gown to wear at afternoon teas and on similar occasions.

"It's such a bargain," she announced, as she unwrapped the goods. In a moment she brought to light a very soft, very heavy and rich silk of a queer old gold color.

The dressmaker looked at it aghast. "What on earth did you buy that for?"

"Why, for an afternoon gown," answered the young person. "Don't you think it's beautiful?"

"But you know you can't possibly wear that on the street?" expostulated the dressmaker.

## Positive Proof of White Slave Traffic.

New York, April 30.—Although the Rockefeller grand jury which was appointed to inquire into the white slave traffic in this city has made no formal report on the result of its investigations, District Attorney Whitman has obtained positive proof that it is possible to buy girls for immoral purposes in New York. To-night four young girls who were purchased by special agents of the District Attorney are in the care of his office, Mr. Whitman announced, and three persons, accused of violating the law against procuring, are under arrest. Two women, one a graduate of Smith College, and the other of Radcliffe, and a man formerly connected with the Government service, were employed as the agents in the case.

## Moran Charged With Manslaughter.

San Francisco, Cal., April 30.—Owen Moran, the English lightweight pugilist, was formally charged with manslaughter to-day as a result of the death of Tommy McCarthy, his opponent in last night's prize fight. Five other men—seconds and attendants of the two pugilists—were booked on the same charge.

When the principals and seconds later were arraigned by Police Judge Conlan, Willie and John McCarthy, brothers of the dead fighter, were released on their own recognizance, while the others were held on \$500 bond each or \$100 cash bail.

In his cell to-day Moran mourned the death of his opponent. "Poor, poor boy," he said weeping, "it was an accident, but oh, such a terrible one."

The Englishman declared the fight was a frame-up, the agreement being, McCarthy was to be allowed to stay fifteen 3-minute rounds.
