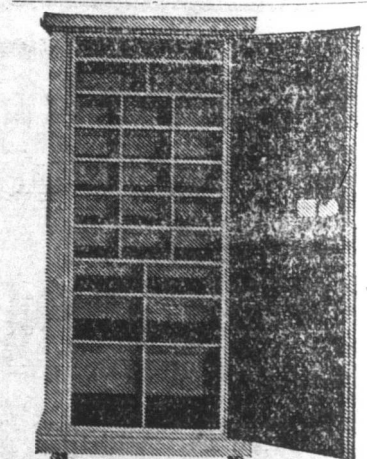

The Reciprocity Bill.

The cable news from Washington points to the passage of the Reciprocity Bill by the Senate. For some time past there has been talk of revolt among the Republican Senators and the jeopardizing of the chances of the passage of the bill unless concessions were made to the paper makers, wool factories, &c. As to the demands of the paper manufacturers, these will be brought to an issue by an amendment of which Senator Root gave notice some weeks ago, and which has attracted much attention since that time. The hopes however of the paper makers have been dashed to the ground. Great as may have been the influence of Senator Root, his amendment was defeated yesterday by an overwhelming majority. As this obstacle was believed to be the most formidable which President Taft had to surmount, and it has now been overcome, it would appear that the passage of the Reciprocity Bill between Canada and the States, so far as Congress is concerned, is now a practical certainty.

House Broken Into.

The residence of Mr. Morrell at Blanc Sablon was broken into last winter and everything movable taken. Mr. Morrell is agent for a Jersey firm there and with his wife and family occupies the house during the summer season only. When he arrived there last week he found that the place had been burglarized and everything stolen.

POLICE COURT NEWS.—In the police court to-day a drunk was discharged. Two others, drunk for the second time this season, were each fined \$1 or 3 days.

A LANTERN EXHIBITION.—There will be a lantern exhibition in the basement of Wesley Church to-night at 8 o'clock. Scriptural subjects will be shown and the slides to be exhibited were never seen here before.

TOW FOR TOPSAIL.—The s.s. Progress arrived here from Bell Island to-day and leaves this afternoon with a full cargo of goods. She tows to Topsail a fine new motor boat, the "Betty P.K." owned by Mr. Harold Harvey and which will be used in Conception Bay.

VESSELS TAKE FISH.—Mr. J. Cornack, of the Customs, to-day had a wire from Sandy Point saying that the schr. B. G. Anderson sailed from there to-day for Halifax with 999 bris, herring and 285 qts. codfish. The schr. Annie E. Larder has also loaded at Burgeo for Europe from 12 Moulton with 3,300 qts. She took part of her cargo at Rose Blanche.

GOVERNOR TAKES HOLIDAY.—His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams with Lady Williams, Mr. Fitzherbert, P.S., and Mr. Chalmers, A.D.C., will go by the Pretorian to-morrow to England where a three months' holiday will be spent. LONDON, To-Day.

One of the most magnificent spectacles, in connection with the Coronation, was the Command performance at Covent Gardens Theatre. The King in Admiral's Uniform wore the Order of the Garter. The Queen's gown was a delicate pink over which the blue ribbon of the Garter showed in marked relief. On the bosom were the Twin Stars of Africa, in diamonds were the Fleur de Lys and the Maltese Cross. The Queen was escorted to the Royal Box by the Crown Prince of Germany. The Crown Princess entered on the arms of His Majesty. After the performance, the royal guests, envoys, and members of the diplomatic corps attended a ball given by the Duke and Duchess of Westminster at Grosvenor House.
