### "Where is That Missing Million?"

Toronto, Oct. 23.—The Mail and Empire, commenting editorially on the census, under the caption, "Where is the Missing Million?" points out that combining the population at the last census with the Government's reports of immigration and an estimated natural increase of one million, the present population should be over eight million. After allowing for the departure of many immigrants who stay in Canada was but temporary, the Mail and Empire continues: "Evidently there is statistical inaccuracy somewhere. If the census is approximately correct, then the immigration figures given out by the Government cannot be right. In ten years the Government expended \$7,768,199. Did the country get all the immigrants the Government reported against the large outflow? Either Canada has been paying for more immigrants than were ever landed on its soil, or it has been paying for the passage for them on to other countries. The new government might well investigate the mystery."
