#### The Bruce Here.


The S. S. Bruce, Capt. Spracklin, the ice harrier outside the harbour was again stopped by the floe halfway and J. L. Slattery. out Sydney harbour. The Stanley again followed the Bruce butting her way out and going only from 5 to 10 feet forward each time she tried to pierce through the pack. The ice could be plainly seen rafting over the Stanley's quarter, from the Bruce's deck as the ship would go astern to continue butting and the floe falling on board on four occasions broke the ship's steering gear, keeping the engineers busy at repairs. The Bruce hammered away butting all that night but could not make any hand of it and had to return to Sydney again on the morning of the 13th., taking water morning of the 13th, taking water and replenishing her bunkers. She left again at 6.15 a.m. on Thursday last, the 14th, but was stopped again at 7.30 a.m., she then had a strong gale of west wind with rain, and get-ting off Cranberry Head had to reting off Cranberry Head had to remain there until Saturday last, the 16th inst. The screw of the wheel chains gave out and had to be repaired, and in going astern at 8.30 a.m. the quadrant was smashed, and the wind having canted the ice and a lake of water making near her the ship got clear of the float 11.25 a.m. and at of water making near her the ship got clear of the floe at 11.35 a.m., and at 1.48 p.m. Flint Island was abeam. The Stanley came out in the Bruce's wake and also got clear. The Bruce was running through heavy field icc from 2 p.m. until 5.30 Saturday and the wheel chains becoming caught on Saturday night an hour was lost in repairing them. The ship came for repairing them. The ship came to port in 281/2 hours after getting clear and she made a good run down. Saturday morning the Stanley brought out another consignment of mails and few passengers making the transfer of these to the Bruce at the edge of the heavy ice.
