## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. SOFIA, Nov. 17.

The subject of peace negotiations is absorbing the entire attention of the Bulgarian Government. The Cabinet lost no time in communicating the contents of the Grand Vizier's letter with reference to the armistice, to its allies, and interchange of views between the Balkan Governments is in active progress. It is stated that peace conditions will be formulated with the least possible delay and presented to Turkey for acceptance or rejection. Unless they are accepted within twenty-four hours after presentation, hostilities will be continued, as it is not intended by the Bulgarian government to permit Turkey to gain valuable time by wrangling over conditions. Prompt acceptance will possibly avert an entry by Bulgarian troops into Constantinople and the Dardanelles.

Special Evening Telegram. SOFIA, Nov. 17.

Regarding the military situation on the Tchalatalja lines, so far as is officially known, no withdrawal has yet occurred. There has been a few encounters between outposts, whilst the Bulgarians have occupied three villages. King Ferdinand is now at Kirik Killiseh, but is reported to be preparing to start to Tchalatalja. The journey can be made along the railroad from Kirik Killiseh, which is now in full operation as far as Tcherkesskevi, the second station from Tchalatalja.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 17.

The Bulgarian terms, reported by the Telegraph's correspondent at Vienna, are (1) the surrender of the Tchalatalja army and its withdrawal guarded by Bulgarians; (2) the evacuation of Scutari, Monastir and Janina; (3) payment of a war indemnity; (4) surrender of conquered territory; (5) opening of the Dardanelles; (6) Saloniki a free port. Since Bulgaria has expressed willingness to leave the status of Constantinople and the Dardanelles to the Powers, some of the demands appear improbable.

Special to Evening Telegram. VIENNA, Nov. 17.

Die Zeet publishes a story of a suicide by a Bulgarian general in the presence of King Ferdinand, after he had been rebuked by the King. The general had been considered responsible for the decimation of the 1st and 6th infantry regiments, which were mowed down, because the general either forgot to cover the charge with artillery, or gave wrong directions for the advance. The general, after his charge, addressed the remnant of his men, praising their heroism. King Ferdinand stood by nodding his approval. When the general had finished, the King said, "General, a word with you." Then, walking up to him before the whole army, he stripped the epaulettes from his uniform. The general remained at attention for a moment, then, saluting the King, he took a few paces to the rear and shot himself. The first regiment was composed of the elite of Serbian lawyers, actors, and business men, and the loss of life in its ranks evoked the bitterest comments.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 17.

The correspondent of the Morning Post, with the Montenegrins, describes an act of heroism by a priest. During an attempt by the Turks to storm a position held by the Montenegrins in the valley of the Doyana River, the commander was taken to the rear, mortally wounded. The chaplain gave him his benediction. Then he snatched up his rifle, and cried, "Forward, sons of Chelmasgora, in defence of the Cross, and for the glory of King Nicholas. The priest, brandishing his cross like a banner, had reached the firing line when a furious volley came from the Turkish column. He stood alone among the recumbent soldiers, who continued to fire. Then he began to chant a hymn to God against the infidel. He reached the lines, which in English run "Tribulation shall not avail to bend the arms of the Lord," when his voice suddenly died away. He waved his arms about his head and fell on his face with a bullet through his heart.
