REASON FOR OCCUPATION.

LONDON, Jan. 31. A despatch from Salonika states that an authoritative statement issued in explanation of the occupation of the Greek fort at Karaburn Peninsula says it was due to the fact that a few days ago a German, submarine approached to within a few miles of the entrance of the Channel leading to he port of Salonika and torpedoed a transport conveying a large number of mules: the transport was beached and a majority of the mules were saved. This attack in Greek territorial waters demonstrated to the Entente naval authorities the necessity for energetic policing of the coast to guarantee full security to the numerous warships, and still more numerous transports, dotting the Gulf and roadstead of Salonika.

NAVAL ACTIVITY ALONG NOR-

WEGIAN COAST. Extraordinary British and German naval activities has been in evidence along the Norwegian coast the past few days, according to the Stavanger correspondent of the Morgen Sladet, who adds that a clash is possible at any time. FRENCH AEROPLANES ENGAGE ATTACKING ZEPPELINS.

PARIS, Jan. 31. Five French aeroplanes engaged he Zeppelins which on Saturday night last dropped bombs on Paris, according to an authoritative state. ent. The first to attack the German aider was a machine piloted by Sergeant, who was occupied patrollng the upper air. He pursued with avage energy, the statement says, ut soon expended all his stock of

over the suburbs westward.
